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Independent Auditor's Report

To the Commissioners
Sauganash Chamber of Commerce
Special Service Area 62

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of Sauganash Chamber of Commerce Special Service Area 62, which comprise the statements of net position and governmental fund balance sheets as of December 31, 2015 and 2014, and the related statements of activities and governmental fund / revenues, expenditures and changes in fund balances for the years then ended, and the related notes to the financial statements.

Management's Responsibility for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America; this includes the design, implementation, and maintenance of internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

Auditor's Responsibility

Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on our audit. We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free of material misstatement.

An audit involves performing procedures to obtain audit evidence about the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. The procedures selected depend on the auditor's judgment, including the assessment of the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error. In making those risk assessments, the auditor considers internal control relevant to the entity's preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the entity's internal control. Accordingly, we express no such opinion. An audit also includes evaluating the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of significant accounting estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall presentation of the financial statements.

We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our audit opinion.

Opinions

In our opinion, the financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of Sauganash Chamber of Commerce Special Service Area 62 as of December 31, 2015 and 2014, and its statements of activities and governmental fund / revenues, expenditures and changes in fund balances, and summary schedule of audit findings for the years then ended in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

Emphasis of Matter

During 2014, the City of Chicago Special Service Areas changed their basis of accounting to follow the standards established by the Government Accounting Standards Board (GASB) applicable to governmental entities. Previously, the City of Chicago Special Service Areas was following a basis of accounting similar to a not-for-profit entity under the standards of the Financial Accounting Standards Board (FASB).

Other Matters

Required Supplementary Information

Management has omitted the management's discussion and analysis that accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America require to be presented to supplement the basic financial statements. Such missing information, although not a part of the basic financial statements, is required by the Governmental Accounting Standards Board who considers it to be an essential part of financial reporting for placing the basic financial statements in an appropriate operational, economic, or historical context. Our opinion on the basic financial statements is not affected by this missing information.

Supplementary Information

Our audit was conducted for the purpose of forming an opinion on the financial statements as a whole. The schedule of revenues and expenditures - budget and actual on page 12 and 13, are presented for comparison and analysis purposes only. The supplementary information is not a required part of the basic financial statements. We have not performed any auditing procedures on the budget amounts and therefore, express no opinion on them.

NOTE 1 – Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

a. Nature of Activities and reporting entity

Sauganash Chamber of Commerce Special Service Area 62 was created by the City of Chicago to provide additional services to the Sauganash community. The primary source of funds is from real estate taxes on certain property in the Special Service Area.

Special Service Area 62 is located in the Sauganash neighborhood in Chicago, supports a vibrant, safe, clean, beautiful, and welcoming commercial district. The boundaries of which are generally bounded by the Edens Expressway and Cicero Avenue on the west, Hiawatha Avenue on the north, the alley east of Cicero Avenue and Keating Avenue on the east, and Caldwell Avenue on the south.

Special Service Area 62 vision is to create a gateway to the Sauganash business district by attracting commercial development, encouraging consumer spending by transforming and enhancing the area around existing retail space, attracting new restaurants, and maximizing occupancy of office space within the underutilized business corridor on Cicero Avenue between Devon and Peterson.

Sauganash Chamber of Commerce Special Service Area 62 is governed by a Commission whose members are appointed by the City. The Commission has contracted with Sauganash Chamber of Commerce to provide additional services within SSA's boundaries. Sauganash Chamber of Commerce is an Illinois non-for-profit corporation that is exempt from federal taxes under Section 501(c)6 of the Internal Revenue Code.

b. Governmental-Wide and Fund Financial Statements

The financial statements of the SSA have been prepared in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in United States of America as

applied to governmental units, hereinafter referred to as GAAP (generally accepted accounting principles). The accepted standard-setting body for establishing governmental accounting and financial reporting principles is GASB (the Governmental Accounting Standards Board).

Governmental-Wide financial statements (statement of net position and statement of activities) are prepared using the economic resources measurement focus and the accrual basis of accounting for all of the SSA's activities. The Fund Financial Statements, which focus on the SSA's governmental funds current financial resources measurement focus, are prepared on the modified accrual basis.

Governmental-wide financial statements (statement of net position and statement of activities) are prepared using the economic resources measurement focus and the accrual basis of accounting for all of the SSA's activities. The fund financial statements, which focus on the SSA's governmental funds current financial resources measurement focus, are prepared on the modified accrual basis.

The SSA accounts for its activities in one fund, its general fund.

c. Measurement Focus, Basis of Accounting and Financial Statement Presentation

The government-wide financial statements are reported using the accrual basis of accounting. Revenues are recorded when earned and expenses are recorded when a liability is incurred regardless of the timing of related cash flows. Property taxes are recognized as revenues in the year in which they are levied.

The governmental fund financial statements are prepared on the modified accrual basis of accounting with only current assets and liabilities included

on the balance sheet. Under the modified accrual basis of accounting, revenues are recorded when susceptible to accrual, both measurable and available to finance expenditures of the current period. Available means collected within the current period or soon enough thereafter to be used to pay liabilities of the current period. Property taxes as susceptible to accrual and recognized as a receivable in the year levied. Revenue recognition is deferred unless the taxes are received within 60 days subsequent to year-end. Expenditures are recorded when the liability is incurred.

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles accepted in the United States of America requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenues and expenditures/expenses during the reported period. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

d. Assets, Liabilities, and Net Position

Cash and cash equivalents

The SSA's cash and cash equivalents are considered to be short term liquid investments such as cash in banks, money markets, and other financial instruments that can be reduced to cash in thirty days or less.

Receivables

All property tax receivables are shown net of allowances. As of December 31, 2015 and 2014, the allowance is estimated to be 2% of the outstanding property taxes.

Fund Equity / Net Position

Governmental fund equity is classified as fund balance. Fund balance is further classified as nonspendable, restricted, committed, assigned, or unassigned. Nonspendable fund balance cannot be spent because of its form. Restricted fund balance has limitations imposed by the SSA board through approval of resolutions. Assigned fund balance is a limitation imposed by a designee of the SSA board. Unassigned fund balance is the net resources in excess of what can be properly classified in one of the above four categories.

When both restricted and unrestricted fund balances are available for use, it is the SSA's policy to use restricted fund balance first, then unrestricted fund balance. Furthermore, committed fund balance is reduced first, followed by assigned amounts, and then unassigned amounts when expenditures are incurred for purposes for which amounts in any of those unrestricted fund balance classifications can be used.

For the government-wide financial statements, net position is reported as invested in capital assets net of related debt, restricted or unrestricted. Invested in capital assets, net of related debt, if applicable, is comprised of the net capital asset balance less any related debt. Restricted net position is when restrictions are placed on net assets from 1) externally imposed by creditors, grantors, contributors, or laws, or regulations of other governments or 2) imposed by law through constitutional provisions or enabling legislation. The remaining net position is classified as unrestricted.

e. Subsequent Events

Subsequent events have been evaluated through April 12, 2016, which is the date the financial statements were available to be issued.

NOTE 2 – Cash and cash equivalents

The SSA defines cash and cash equivalents as short term liquid investments such as cash in banks, money markets, and other financial instruments that can be reduced to cash in thirty days or less. The SSA maintains its cash balance in a financial institution located in Chicago, IL. The balance is insured by the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation up to \$250,000. The SSA's cash balance did not exceed the insurance level as of December 31, 2015 and 2014.

NOTE 3 – Property taxes

The SSA's principal source of revenue is from real estate taxes levied on certain property located in its boundaries. Property taxes become an enforceable lien on real property on January 1 of the year it is levied. Taxes are payable in two installments in the subsequent year. The first installment is an estimate based on the prior year billed levy (55%) and is due March. The second installment is due in August or 30 days from the mailing of the tax bills, if issued later than July 1. The second installment is based on the remaining amount of the levy on file with the County. Bills are issued and collected by Cook County who remits the SSA's share to the City who then remits the monies to the SSA.

NOTE 4 – Deferred Inflows of Revenue

A deferred inflow of resources / property tax revenue represents an acquisition of fund balance that applies to a future period and therefore will not be recognized as an inflow of resources (revenue) until that future time.

NOTE 5 – Accounts Payable

Accounts payable balance at December 31, 2015 and 2014, is \$4,378 and \$20,016, respectively. These balances consist of expenses / services incurred during the respective year related to holiday lighting, SSA management and personnel costs.

NOTE 6 – Fund Equity / Net Position

During 2014, the City of Chicago Special Service Areas changed their basis of accounting to follow the standards established by the Government Accounting Standards Board (GASB) applicable to governmental entities. Previously, the City of Chicago Special Service Areas was following a basis of accounting similar to a not-for-profit entity under the standards of the Financial Accounting Standards Board (FASB).

The SSA is required to present information regarding its financial position and activities according to the Agreement for Sauganash Chamber of Commerce Special Service Area 62 between the City of Chicago and Sauganash Chamber of Commerce. As of December 31, 2015 and 2014, the SSA had total fund balances of \$70,289 and \$37,128, respectively.

These funds will be utilized in this special service area during future years. If the SSA would have continued to follow the basis of accounting by the standards under FASB, the ending carry over amount / fund balance / net assets would have been \$68,990 and \$35,779, for years ending December 31, 2015 and 2014, respectively. The net carryover amount at December 31, 2015, \$68,990, represents 60% of the original approved 2015 budget.

Sauganash Chamber of Commerce Special Service Area 62 was advised by Sauganash Chamber of Commerce, sole service provider of SSA 62, that approval was made for this carryover of \$68,990, to be allocated to a reserve directly related to the following future projects related to hardscape / community identifiers and other initiated projects.

NOTE 7 – Related Party Transactions

The SSA is affiliated with Sauganash Chamber of Commerce as its sole service provider. Special service area 62 shares office space, equipment, and employees through this affiliation. Special Service Area 62 has no employees of their own, but reimburses Sauganash Chamber of Commerce for payroll and related costs of the individuals working on the programs. It also reimburses Sauganash Chamber of Commerce for a portion of its operating expenses.
