



## Chicago Police Boards 2025 Goal

### Goal 1

**Context for Goal:** Section 2-84-030 of the Municipal Code of Chicago grants the Police Board the power to adopt the Rules and Regulations for the governance of the Chicago Police Department. The current version of the Rules and Regulations was adopted in the 1970s, with one new section added in 1998 and minor revisions made in 2021.

Reviewing and updating the Rules and Regulations is a complex undertaking that involves input from a diverse group of stakeholders. The initial step is to establish a clear process for reviewing the existing rules and evaluating suggestions for revisions. Before the actual work of updating begins, stakeholders will have the opportunity to provide input on both the substance of the rules and the proposed process. This preliminary phase ensures that stakeholders are well-informed about the approach, understand how the work will proceed, and know how they will be engaged or kept updated throughout the process.

**Goal for 2025:** The Police Board president will: (1) work with the Board to conduct a comprehensive review of the Rules and Regulations to determine which existing rules and regulations should be revised, modified or deleted, and to identify new rules and regulations that should be implemented to ensure that the Chicago Police Department's Rules and Regulations align with the principles of 21st-century constitutional policing, promote transparency and accountability, enhance community trust and foster equitable and effective law enforcement practices; (2) develop a process to conduct the review and revision of the rules; and (3) hold listening sessions with the following stakeholders to discuss their views on selected areas for proposed changes to the Rules and Regulations and a process for undertaking the review which will maximize public input and transparency:

- The Mayor
- Members of the City Council;
- Deputy Mayor for Community Safety;
- Leadership of the Chicago Police Department, Civilian Office of Police Accountability, Public Safety Section of the Office of the Inspector General, the Community Commission for Public Safety and Accountability, and the Department of Law;
- Leadership of the unions representing members of the Chicago Police Department;
