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1 VICE PRESIDENT TERRY: Good evening. Good evening. Thank you, all, for being here. 2 I'm 3 Commissioner Remel Terry. I also serve as Vice President for the Commission. And so the October 4 30th, 2024, meeting of the Community Commission 5 for Public Safety and Accountability is called to 6 7 order. I'll start with giving a call of 8 the roll. Commissioner Driver. Commissioner 9 Gottlieb. 10 COMMISSIONER GOTTLIEB: Present. 11 VICE PRESIDENT TERRY: Commissioner Minor. 12 COMMISSIONER MINOR: Present. 13 14 VICE PRESIDENT TERRY: Commissioner Presley. COMMISSIONER PRESLEY: 15 VICE PRESIDENT TERRY: Commissioner 16 17 Navarijo. COMMISSIONER NAVARIJO: Present. 18 VICE PRESIDENT TERRY: Commissioner Terry is 19 present. Commissioner Wortham. 20 COMMISSIONER WORTHAM: Present. 21 22 VICE PRESIDENT TERRY: With six members of 23 the Community Commission for Public Safety and Accountability present, we have a quorum, and we 24

1 can conduct the Commission business.

Our first order of business is the 2 public comments. If you would like to share 3 something related to the Commission's work on 4 Public Safety and Accountability, you have a few 5 options. You can speak at a public meeting such 6 7 as this. You can also submit public comment in writing by emailing your comment to 8 CommunityCommissionPublicComment@ 9 CityofChicago.org, or you can bring a copy of 10 your comment to one of the Commission's public 11 12 meetings and give it to someone on the Commission 13 or someone on the Commission staff. 14 People who wanted to speak during the public comment period tonight were asked to 15 submit their names in writing earlier tonight. 16 17 The names have been drawn, and we have the list. If your name is called to offer public comment, 18 please approach the microphone, line up in the 19 order in which your name was called. When it is 20 your turn to speak, please say your name, spell 21 22 your name, and then offer your comments. Each speaker will have two minutes, and we do have a 23 timekeeper, so we ask that you all respect the 24

1 time, and we have allotted 20 minutes for public 2 comment.

So with that being said, our first 3 -- I'm going to call the first three speakers: 4 Kobi Guillory, Beth Rochford, and Jonathan Grace. 5 MR. GUILLORY: Good evening, everybody. 6 I appreciate the opportunity to come up here and 7 speak before you all. 8 My name is Kobi, K-O-B-I, last name 9 G-U-I-L-L-O-R-Y. I am one of the cochairs of the 10 Chicago Alliance against Racist and Political 11 12 Repression. I'm also a middle school science teacher at Kipling Elementary, which is down the 13 street. And I'm here because I want to implore 14 the Commissioners to do whatever is in your power 15 to eliminate traffic stops. 16 17 You know, we fought for this Commission as part of a vision to transform 18

public safety in Chicago as part of a movement, as part of a campaign that's been going on for decades in the City, to bring the police under the control of the communities, and that is sorely, sorely needed.

I have several union brothers,

black men, who have been pulled over by the 1 police like routinely, like once every few 2 months. And it starts very, very young. 3 I have a couple eighth grade 4 5 students who have been harassed by the police just walking down the street, you know. So this 6 is part of the system. These traffic stops are 7 part of the system that limits the possibilities 8 in life of our black children. 9 So we need to transform that. 10 We need to transform that with policies like the 11 12 traffic stop policy and with broader systems, like getting the Community Commission 13 established. 14 And also I want to give a shout-out 15 16 to the District Councilors who are in the room, 17 because that is, again, part of what we need to be doing to transform the system into one where 18 our black children can grow up in peace and in 19 20 safety. We have to hold these police 21 22 accountable for what they do and what they don't do, which is they don't actually keep people 23 safe, and all they are doing is harassing and 24

1 arresting. Thank you for your time.

VICE PRESIDENT TERRY: 2 Thank you. MS. ROCHFORD: Hello. I'm Elizabeth 3 Rockford, 17th District Councilor. Elizabeth, 4 traditional spelling. Rochford, R-O-C-H-F-O-R-D. 5 Here to just let you know that, again, at our 6 7 last District Council meeting, my constituents brought up their concerns about the Oath Keeper 8 working in the district. They had many questions 9 for the commander who was present at the meeting 10 who refused to answer a lot of their questions, 11 12 which was very disappointing; that the CPD leadership is not able to answer the community's 13 questions or willing to answer the Community's 14 questions. And when the community expressed 15 16 concern about his boss who was recently arrested 17 and had that person's policing powers taken away, the community was looking for him to say 18 something about that hurting trust of the 19 community towards the Police Department when one 20 of their senior leadership is arrested, and the 21 22 commander just was not able to go there and not 23 able to say that that limits trust that the community has. And so that's very concerning to 24

1 my constituents.

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2 So I just wanted to bring that 3 forward so that you know that what the concerns are in the 17th District. So thank you. 4 VICE PRESIDENT TERRY: 5 Thank you. REVEREND GRACE: Hello. My name is Reverend 6 Jonathan Grace. Im the lead pastor at Urban 7 Village Church here in Chicago. 8 I'm here to speak to accountability 9 and public safety and ask that the CCPSA release 10 an outline of the Consent Decree provision and 11 12 provide transparency of how data input guided the 13 outline. Speaking of that, because I moved 14 here from Dallas -- Go, Cowboys. Okay. And 15 16 growing up as a white guy from the suburbs, I was 17 taught the police are our friends, caretakers of the people, and that's what I believed most of my 18 life. And I worked with the police in Dallas, 19 and took a tour of a police training facility 20 where there was this area where they would train, 21 22 and there was a sign that said, "Bleed in here so you don't bleed out there." 23

The reason the disconnect between

the way that police officers are perceived, the 1 goal -- and the goal of policing and often how I 2 think police officers perceive the people they 3 are called to care for, and that's with suspicion 4 and fear. Their encounters result in deaths, the 5 people that police work with, the public as 6 perceived as this threat. Most important thing 7 is to go home at the end of the night. And when 8 you mix that fear with the people you're supposed 9 to be protecting, with good old-fashioned 10 American racism, what happens is we have great 11 12 violence and death that falls upon black and brown bodies. And that's how we get the Sonya 13 Masseys and Dexter Reeds and many other names we 14 could list. 15

16 What I'm hoping to do tonight is 17 persuade us to start rebuilding trust between the police that are called to serve and protect and 18 enforce our laws. And the community that so 19 often experiences police brutality and violence, 20 we need community and policing based on caring 21 22 and compassion and love and justice, instead of fear and hurt and possibility of death. 23

So to word it from my friends at

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Community Renewal Society, committee members need 1 a clear document to respond to via email or 2 written submissions in order to have transparent 3 dialogue between CCPSA stakeholders and the 4 public. Let's rebuild trust and accountability. 5 Thank you for your time. 6 7 VICE PRESIDENT TERRY: Thank you. Our next three speakers are Pastor 8 Doyle, Jay Ramiro, Jackson Patton. I'll also 9 call the last person that we have, Gail Farley. 10 PASTOR DOYLE: Good evening. For the record, 11 12 I signed after my name, "United States Marine Corps veteran," and my comments are directed at 13 Commissioner Wortham. 14 So this is my mother's Bible. By 15 the way, if you heard this before in another 16 17 forum, you know where I'm leading. On September 19th, at a Police 18 Board meeting, I was very direct about the 19 dismissal of a councilor. What I will never 20 forget ever is the next day, I received this 21 Bible by default. 22 23 My mother passed away peacefully in Dolton on September 20th. A 25-year-old -- a 24

25-year-old virgin raised by a Christian bishop
 in Fort Lauderdale, it is my mother whom I
 represent this October 30th.

So at the last Police Board meeting, when I asked the Police Board how to dismiss a councilor from the 22nd District who has been defamatory, I was told that it was this body and chain of command. I understand the chain of command.

10 This would be me at 19. 35 years 11 later, it is this Marine Corps veteran who asked 12 that on your November 14th meeting on your agenda 13 read the dismissal of the African American female 14 22nd District Councilor who has been defamatory. 15 Thank you.

16 VICE PRESIDENT TERRY: Thank you.

MR. RAMIRO: Good evening, Councilors. My name is Jay Ramiro. I am a student pastor at Urban Village Church. I'm also a nurse and a student at the University of Chicago. Someone who is very committed and integrated into the community. I'm also a member -- a community member at Hyde Park Police District 02.

Now, I have been privileged to

never have been stopped by CPD, but I am here to speak on behalf of the black and Latine members of my community, my church, and my neighborhood that surround -- and the neighborhood that surrounds mine that fear every day not if, but when it should happen.

And so I take this time today to implore the Board to make a traffic stop Consent Decree provision which outlines a robust policy to, one, limit global level stops that have no impact on traffic safety; two, eliminate pretextual stops as a practice; and three, end susipcionless consent searches.

Once such a policy is enacted by the Board, I ask them to also hold CPD accountable by implementing reform through data-driven measures and make that data available to the public.

I thank you all for your service, and I urge you to do your due diligence to end violence and harassment caused by pretextual stops. Thank you.

23 VICE PRESIDENT TERRY: Thank you.
24 MR. PATTON: My name is Jackson Patton,

1 J-A-C-K-S-O-N, P-A-T-T-O-N.

2	Good evening, I live in District 9
3	in the Back of the Yards. I'm a blue-collar
4	worker. I'm a husband, and I love this City.
5	Like anyone else just trying to work and survive,
6	I'm concerned about the violence in my
7	neighborhood and danger on the roads.
8	The assumption is that the police
9	force exists to reduce violence and risk to
10	ordinary people, but when I hear sirens, and I
11	see blue lights, I don't feel any safer. For me,
12	police presence feels like another item on a list
13	of dangers in the City, and I know I am not alone
14	in that feeling.
15	I want to see a different
16	relationship form between our community, our City
17	leaders, and our police departments.
18	I want there to be a collaboration
19	between all of us in creating this relationship.
20	I would like to see an outline of the consent
21	of the Consent Decree made public and
22	transparency about how the outline was created.
23	I want a decree that is driven by actual data.
24	And I want us as a community to be able to have

continued dialogue with the Board about the 1 decree. This way, any changes in policy will be 2 3 fact driven and designed to reduce harm to our communities' intangible ways. 4 The Consent Decree must have a 5 6 provision to stop pretextual stops. 7 I have discovered enough bright orange envelopes on my windshield to know that 8 the City does a well enough job enforcing fines 9 for violations like expired registrations without 10 a police confrontation. And there must be a 11 12 provision to prevent police from preventing -- to prevent police from conducting a vehicle search 13 without probable cause. This way we can create 14 trust and safety in our community. 15 16 VICE PRESIDENT TERRY: Time. Thank you. So 17 we have one more speaker, Gail. Are you rescinding? 18 Thank you. So we've reached the end of the 19 public comment period. Thank you, again, to all 20 the speakers. We truly do value your input. 21 Our next order of business is to 22 23 introduce the seventh Commissioner of the Community Commission for Public Safety and 24

1 Accountability.

On September 18th, the City Council 2 3 voted to appoint Angel Rubi Navarijo to the Commission. I'd like to welcome Angel and give 4 him an opportunity to introduce himself to the 5 public. 6 7 COMMISSIONER NAVARIJO: Thank you very much, Vice President Terry. 8 Hi, everybody. My name is Angel 9 Rubi Navarijo. I am a north side resident. 10 Currently, I live in Portage Park. I was born in 11 12 Guatemala originally. I emigrated to the United States when I was four years old and have grown 13 up here ever since. 14 15 Like I said, I grew up in Albany 16 Park, from the northwest side. I attended Loyola 17 for my undergraduate. And I'm the current director of Constituent Services for the 48th 18 ward Alderwoman. 19 My experience consists of working 20 for elected officials at different levels of 21 22 government. I've had the pleasure to work at 23 every level of government, and I've worked for a total of eight doing community outreach, 24

legislative work, communications work, and I look
 forward to hearing everybody's feedback.

3 I really do want to come into this work with an independent mind and open-minded to 4 hear people's ideas and feedback about what's 5 important to you. And thank you for allowing me 6 7 the privilege of representing you all here on this Commission. I really do look forward to 8 working with all the stakeholders, our officers, 9 COPA, the Police Board, and everybody who is 10 involved to make our community safer. I'm really 11 12 excited about the work ahead. Although I know there are challenges, I am very optimistic. 13 In collaboration and community, we will get through 14 it. So I am very optimistic, and I look forward 15 meeting you all in the next coming years, two to 16 17 be exact. Thank you very much, everyone, for your patience as well. I understand this wasn't 18 easy for the Commission and others. So I thank 19 you. I look forward to serving you all. 20

21 VICE PRESIDENT TERRY: Thank you,22 Commissioner.

The next order of business is the approval of minutes. So before today's meeting,

draft minutes of the Commission's meetings held 1 on September 26th and October 9th were shared 2 3 with all Commissioners. Are there any corrections to the draft minutes that have been 4 circulated? 5 6 If there are no corrections, is there a motion to approve the minutes of the 7 Commission meetings held on September 26th and 8 October 9th? 9 COMMISSIONER NAVARIJO: So moved. 10 COMMISSIONER MINOR: Second. 11 12 VICE PRESIDENT TERRY: Commissioner Navajo has moved to approve the minutes of the 13 Commission's September 26 and October 9th 14 meetings, Commissioner Minor has seconded. 15 Is 16 there any debate on the motion? 17 (NO RESPONSE.) VICE PRESIDENT TERRY: Hearing none, we will 18 move to a vote. So those in favor of adopting 19 the motion to approve the minutes of the 20 Commission's September 26th and October 9th 21 22 meetings, please signal by saying aye. 23 (CHORUS OF AYES.) 24 VICE PRESIDENT TERRY: Those opposed, please 1 say nay.

2 (NO RESPONSE.) 3 VICE PRESIDENT TERRY: The ayes have it, and the motion carries. The minutes are approved. 4 Our next order of business will be 5 new business. We will begin with motions to fill 6 vacancies in District Councils. 7 So pardon me as I read what I have 8 to read per our ordinance. Under state law, when 9 there is vacancy in an elected position in 10 Chicago, the Mayor has the power to fill the 11 12 vacancy, but under City ordinance, when there is a vacancy for an elected District Council 13 position, the District Council and the Commission 14 also play a role in filling the vacancy. 15 16 Under Chicago Municipal Code 17 Section 2-80-070, when there is a vacancy in a District Council, the existing members of the 18 District Council have 30 days to nominate three 19 candidates for the vacancy to the Commission. 20 The Commission then has a total of 60 days from 21 22 the creation of the vacancy to select one of 23 these candidates to recommend to the Mayor for appointment to the District Council. Then the 24

1 Mayor chooses someone to fill the vacancy.

I will begin by discussing our recommendations to fill three District Council vacancies. One on the 2nd District Council, one on the 17th District Council, and one on the 24th District Council.

7 Pursuant to the law I described, the remaining members of each of the three District 8 Councils held an application process and 9 interviews for candidates to fill the vacancies. 10 The remaining Councilors worked diligently to 11 12 ensure wide promotion of the application opportunity and a careful process for reviewing 13 qualified candidates. 14

15 The Commission thanks the remaining members of the District Council 2, 17, and 24 for 16 17 their hard work in raising awareness about the vacancy and vetting candidates to join their 18 respective Councils to serve their districts. 19 After completing their review of 20 qualified applicants, the remaining Councilors of 21 22 each of the Councils voted in public meetings to 23 nominate three candidates for the respective vacancies. The names then went to the Commission 24

for consideration. The Commission reviewed the
 application materials for all candidates, three
 for each vacancy. The Commission also conducted
 interviews of all candidates.

5 Before proceeding to recommendation, 6 the Commission thanks all of the candidates for 7 applying to serve on their local District 8 Councils. For those we do not suggest for 9 recommendation, we hope you will stay involved in 10 the work of CCPSA.

11 So for the 2nd DC vacancy -- we will 12 move on the vacancy to District Council 2. Is 13 there a motion to recommend to the Mayor a 14 candidate to fill the vacancy in the 2nd District 15 Council?

COMMISSIONER MINOR: Thank you, Commissioner
 Terry for letting me use your microphone.

I move that the Commission recommend that the Mayor appoint Marquinn McDonald to fill the District Council 2 vacancy.

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22 community organizing, advocacy, and service with
23 such organizations as WatchGuard Chicago, Quantum
24 Martial Arts, Free Women's Self-Protection

Marquinn has ten plus years of

1 Program, and The Rite to Wellness Campaign.

As an educator, he has an extensive career as a martial arts instructor, youth mentor and boxing coach for a variety of Chicago elementary and high schools, along with other nonprofits.

7 VICE PRESIDENT TERRY: Is there a second to8 this motion?

9 COMMISSIONER NAVARIJO: Second.

10 VICE PRESIDENT TERRY: Commissioner Minor has 11 moved to recommend that the Mayor appoint 12 Marquinn McDonald to fill the vacancy on the 2nd 13 District Council and Commissioner Navarijo has 14 seconded.

15 Is there any debate on the motion?16 (NO RESPONSE.)

17 VICE PRESIDENT TERRY: Hearing no further 18 debate, we will move to a vote. Those in favor 19 of adopting the motion to recommend that the 20 Mayor appoint Marquinn McDonald to fill the 21 vacancy on the 2nd District Council, please say 22 aye.

23 (CHORUS OF AYES.)
 24 VICE PRESIDENT TERRY: Those opposed, please

1 say nay.

2 (NO RESPONSE.) 3 VICE PRESIDENT TERRY: The ayes have it, and the motion carries. 4 Congratulations, Marguinn McDonald. 5 We will send your name to the Office of the Mayor 6 for Mayor Johnson to consider selecting an 7 appointment for the 2nd District Council vacancy. 8 So now we are moving on to the 17th 9 District Council vacancy. Now we will share more 10 on the vacancy on the District Council 17. 11 Is 12 there a motion to recommend to the Mayor a candidate to fill the vacancy in the 17th 13 District Council? 14 COMMISSIONER PRESLEY: I move the Commission 15 16 recommend that the Mayor appoint Grace Patino to 17 fill the District Council position for the District Council 17 vacancy. Grace regularly 18 attends 17th District Council monthly meetings. 19 She has also been involved with police 20 accountability since 2017 with the Chicago 21 22 Alliance Against Racist and Political Repression.

As a volunteer, she worked to pass the Empowering

24 Communities for Public Safety ordinance and

served on their steering committee -- their 1 2 steering and executive committee as treasurer. Graces also has extensive legal and advocacy 3 experience through her work as a paralegal. Is 4 there a second? 5 6 COMMISSIONER GOTTLIEB: Second. VICE PRESIDENT TERRY: Commissioner Presley 7 has moved to recommend that the Mayor appoint 8 Grace Patino to fill the vacancy on the 17th 9 District Council, and Commissioner Gottlieb has 10 seconded. Is there any debate on the motion? 11 12 (NO RESPONSE.) VICE PRESIDENT TERRY: Hearing no further 13 debate, we will move to a vote. 14 15 Those in favor of adopting the motion to recommend that the Mayor appoint Grace 16 17 Patino to fill the vacancy on the 17th District Council, please signal by saying aye. 18 (CHORUS OF AYES.) 19 20 VICE PRESIDENT TERRY: Those opposed, please 21 say nay. 22 COMMISSIONER WORTHAM: Nay. 23 VICE PRESIDENT TERRY: The ayes have it, and the motion carries. Congratulations, Grace 24

Patino. We will send your name to the Office of
 the Mayor for Mayor Johnson to consider selecting
 you for an appointment to the 17th District
 Council. Congratulations again.

5 Now we shall move to the vacancy on 6 District Council 24. Is there a motion to 7 recommend to the Mayor a candidate to fill the 8 vacancy in the 24th District?

9 COMMISSIONER GOTTLIEB: Yes. I move that the 10 Commission recommend that the Mayor appoint Keo 11 Jean-Joseph to fill the District Council 24 12 vacancy.

13 Keo is a 40th Ward resident and Linkage Manager with the Lighthouse Institute. 14 15 Since 2020, he has coordinated mutual aid 16 projects between residents in need and local 17 businesses in the 40th Ward. With the Lighthouse Institute, they use motivational interviewing to 18 understand what drives a client's desire for 19 change and creates an action plan of support with 20 the client. Before that, Keo was the Evanston 21 22 YMCA'S Member Relations and Community Engagement 23 Specialist developing partnerships with small businesses. 24

1 COMMISSIONER MINOR: Second.

VICE PRESIDENT TERRY: Commissioner Gottlieb 2 3 has moved to recommend that the Mayor appoint Keo Jean-Joseph to fill the vacancy on the 24th 4 District Council, and Commissioner Minor has 5 seconded. 6 7 Is there any debate on the motion? 8 (NO RESPONSE.) 9 VICE PRESIDENT TERRY: Hearing no further 10 debate, we will move to a vote. Those in favor 11 12 of adopting a motion to recommend that the Mayor appoint Keo Jean-Joseph to fill the vacancy on 13 14 24th the District Council, please say aye. 15 (CHORUS OF AYES.) 16 VICE PRESIDENT TERRY: Those opposed, please 17 say nay. (NO RESPONSE.) 18 VICE PRESIDENT TERRY: Congratulations, Keo 19 Jean-Joseph. We will send your name to the 20 Office of the Mayor for the Mayor Johnson to 21 22 consider selecting an appointment to the 24th 23 District Council vacancy. Now we shall move on to consider an 24

amendment to the bylaws. Commissioner Navajo. 1 COMMISSIONER NAVARIJO: Thank you. The CCPSA 2 3 ordinance establishes a Commission's responsibility to create certain operational 4 policies and procedures for the Commission. 5 The Commission has established 6 bylaws that are posted on our website. 7 Today I will present the amendment 8 to the bylaws which the Commission received ahead 9 of this meeting. 10 This amendment makes a clarifying 11 12 correction to the terms of the NAC members. Ιt removes language that provides that their terms 13 run concurrently with the president and vice 14 president. This correction was necessary because 15 16 it will allow for subsequent commissions to 17 engage in a full application, vetting, and interview process necessary to thoughtfully fill 18 these possessions. Removal of the concurrent 19 terms language also gives NAC members who are 20 appointed by the interim Commission full two year 21 22 terms, which will expire in January of 2025. 23 VICE PRESIDENT TERRY: Are there any questions on the amendment? 24

1 (NO RESPONSE.) 2 VICE PRESIDENT TERRY: Seeing no further questions, is there a motion? 3 COMMISSIONER NAVARIJO: I'm going to mess 4 this up. In accordance with MCC 2-80-050, I move 5 to adopt the proposed amendment to the bylaws. 6 7 COMMISSIONER GOTTLIEB: Second. VICE PRESIDENT TERRY: Commissioner Navarijo 8 has moved to adopt the amendment to the bylaws, 9 and Commissioner Gottlieb has seconded. Is there 10 any debate on the motion? 11 12 (NO RESPONSE.) 13 VICE PRESIDENT TERRY: Hearing none, we will move to a vote. Those in favor of adopting the 14 motion to adopt the proposed bylaws as amended, 15 please signal by saying aye. 16 17 (CHORUS OF AYES.) VICE PRESIDENT TERRY: Those opposed, please 18 19 say nay. (NO RESPONSE.) 20 VICE PRESIDENT TERRY: The ayes have it, and 21 the motion carries. 22 23 Our next order of business will be a presentation by the Chicago Police Department 24

on district strategic plan model. To present
 this information, I would like to welcome
 Community Policing Director Glen Brooks to
 present.

5 DIRECTOR BROOKS: Good evening, all. Good 6 evening, Commissioners. Good evening, all. I'm 7 here on behalf of Superintendent Snelling, and I 8 would like to present regarding our update.

9 So we want to present a couple of 10 things regarding the goals. At our quarterly 11 updates to the CCPSA, we had provided district 12 strategic plans and quarterly updates for both 13 the first and second quarter.

Another goal of the Superintendent in 2024 was to complete a comprehensive review of all CAPS programs. Let me just pause here. Can they hear us online? I just want to make sure. We're good. Thank you.

Again, the Superintendent committed in 2024 to complete a comprehensive review of all CAPS programs. So rather than separating these two projects, the Department has included a review of the district strategic plans, along with the CAPS assessment and a total review.

1 The comprehensive assessment 2 includes all of our community engagement and 3 community engagement sessions both for -- with the CCPSA and members of the public. 4 If you are interested in attending, 5 we will post or we will send all of the public 6 dates to the Commission for distribution among 7 District Council members and members of the 8 public. 9 However, in terms of our district 10 strategic plans, we've included all the District 11 Councils and invited all the District Councils to 12 participate in the district unit plans. 13 It is important to note that these 14 have begun in October; however, every single 15 district will have at least two rounds of 16 17 sessions where we have public input in those districts' strategic plans. Those plans are 18 designed to address the districts' not only crime 19 problems, but also look for strategies to engage 20 in community betterment and looking forward to 21 22 working with the District Councils. 23 Additionally, we posted all of those meetings on not only the District social 24

media plans, but you can also find it at Chicago 1 Police website under Community Policing where you 2 will find all of those meetings moving forward. 3 As always, for input engagement, to 4 develop a plan together is welcome and really 5 6 requested. 7 That is what I have for the conclusion of the Superintendent's report. 8 Is there any additional thing I can 9 provide? 10 Are there VICE PRESIDENT TERRY: Thank you. 11 12 any questions from the Commissioners? Thank you 13 so much. Thank you all very much. 14 DIRECTOR BROOKS: VICE PRESIDENT TERRY: So our next order of 15 16 business will be reports and updates. 17 We will begin by discussing Quarter 3 goals for the Chicago Police Department, the 18 Civilian Office for Police Accountability, and 19 the Police Board. 20 Commissioner Minor will provide an 21 22 update on the CPD goals. 23 COMMISSIONER MINOR: Awesome. Thank you. The Commission received the CPD Quarter 3 goal 24

1 deliverables, which included an update on the Workforce Allocation Study and update to 2 civilianization post-hiring freeze. 3 Per CPD, the workforce application 4 study is almost ready to launch. The City, CPD, 5 the Commercial Club, and the funders are wrapping 6 up negotiations on roles, processes and 7 reporting. 8 Additionally, the Commercial Club 9 must pass a resolution approving the spending for 10 the workforce allocation study. 11 12 Per CPD, the resolution should be approved and finalized in the coming weeks. 13 CPD has begun internal work on the 14 study by informing relevant CPD units of the data 15 that will be needed for assessment and analysis 16 17 upon the study's launch. Civilianization efforts have 18 currently been halted by the City's hiring 19 freeze. For applicants that were in the hiring 20 process, CPD can still proceed with hiring them; 21 however, new applications are not being 22 considered currently. 23 CPD is working on new district 24

strategic plans for 2025, and Districts are 1 currently soliciting feedback from community 2 members, through community conversations, on what 3 should be included in those plans. In the 4 Commission's quarterly meeting with the 5 Superintendent, CPD committed to specifically 6 7 engaging District Councils in the planning efforts. 8

9 Tonight, we heard from Director 10 Glen Brooks on what is included in the District 11 strategic plans, the Department's plan for 12 community engagement on those plans, and how the 13 Department intends to use the information moving 14 forward.

15 CPD is undertaking a community 16 policing assessment. The Civic Consulting 17 Alliance, an outside consulting agency, is 18 performing the study and has begun the community 19 engagement stages. Several community-based 20 organizations have been contacted to assist with 21 the outreach phase of the assessment.

22 VICE PRESIDENT TERRY: Thank you,

23 Commissioner Minor.

Are there any questions or comments

from the Commission on the CPD goals? Thank you. 1 Next, Commissioner Presley will 2 provide an update on COPA goals. 3 COMMISSIONER PRESLEY: Thank you. The 4 Commission goal team met with Chief Kersten on 5 October 16th to get updates on the 2024 goals, 6 and we began discussing 2025 goals. 7 There are some -- the following are 8 some of the highlights of that discussion. 9 The Commission established a goal 10 for COPA in 2024 to work collaboratively to 11 12 develop internal guidance and policy revisions to improve COPA's consistency in several areas, 13 including, but not limited to, disciplinary 14 recommendations. 15 This quarter, COPA began to pilot 16 17 parts of the newly drafted disciplinary recommendation guidance that was submitted to the 18 Independent Monitoring Team in the tenth 19 reporting period. 20 COPA staff developed and implemented 21 22 a preliminary training for select supervisors and 23 investigators on how to consider aggravating and mitigating factors when making disciplinary 24

1 recommendations.

We look forward to providing an 2 update on this at future meetings once internal 3 training is completed and an assessment of the 4 program can be completed. 5 COPA's new Mediation Director, 6 7 Daisha Muhammad, joined COPA in August and is collaborating with internal and external 8 stakeholders to develop a comprehensive mediation 9 policy with strong community input. 10 On October 24th, Commissioner 11 12 Gottlieb, along with several DCs, had an opportunity to meet with Director Muhammad, and 13 discuss ways in which we can work together. 14 15 This was an extremely productive meeting, and we look forward to our continued 16 17 collaboration with Director Muhammad. Chief Kersten informed Commissioners 18 that the Policy Research and Planning Division, 19 PRAD, is now fully staffed. 20 COPA filled the two vacant data 21 22 scientist positions that will enable the unit to 23 better utilize quantitative data to identify patterns of misconduct through data anomalies and 24

other trends. Identifying pattern and practice 1 in misconduct is incredibly important. 2 3 The Commission will continue to put a strong emphasis on this as we work on both 2024 4 and 2025 goals with COPA. 5 VICE PRESIDENT TERRY: Thank you so much, 6 7 Commissioner Presley. Are there any questions or comments 8 from the Commission related to the COPA goals? 9 Thank you. 10 Next we will have Commissioner 11 12 Navarijo provide an update on the Police Board 13 qoals. 14 COMMISSIONER NAVARIJO: Thank you. The 15 Police Board continues to work towards a completion of its 2024 goals that are not 16 17 impacted by the arbitration ruling. A key component has been to schedule more training 18 around consistency and rulings on cases. This 19 will continue to be important as the Police Board 20 will be onboarding three new members in the near 21 future. 22 23 Another key goal for the Police

Board was to encourage greater community

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engagement around its work. The partnership with
CAN-TV continues to be a success. The Police
Board also continues to be a place where the
community can provide feedback on issues
regarding the Police Board of accountability in
general.

7 VICE PRESIDENT TERRY: Thank you so much,8 Commissioner Navarijo.

9 Do you have any questions related 10 to the Police Board goals? Okay.

The next order of business isPolice Board nominations.

13 Commissioner Presley will discuss14 the Police Board nominations.

15 COMMISSIONER PRESLEY: As we reported in earlier Commission meetings, the Commission has 16 17 been working to fill the Commission -- fulfill the Commission's role under CCPSA Ordinance 18 Chapter 2-80-080, specifically as it pertains to 19 identify qualified candidates to present to the 20 Mayor in order to fill Police Board vacancies. 21 22 The law gives the Commission 23 responsibility for nominating candidates to serve 24 on the Police Board. The Mayor has the final say

1	on who is on the Board, but the Mayor can only
2	choose from the list created by the Commission.
3	On October 9th at a special
4	meeting, the Commission voted to recommend Steven
5	Block for reappointment to the Board, and the
6	Commission recommended the following individuals
7	for three open seats:
8	Valencia Ahmad;
9	Cynthia Velazquez;
10	Debra Dyer-Webster;
11	Chris Griffin;
12	Tyler Hall;
13	Arlette Porter. And Jacque Stephanic.
14	Pursuant to municipal code, within
15	30 days, or by November 9th, the Mayor shall
16	select a candidate for each of the four vacancies
17	or reject the candidates and provide the
18	Commission with a written explanation which the
19	Commission shall make publicly available no later
20	than three business days after receipt.
21	Police Board appointments are
22	subject to the advice and consent of City
23	Counsel.
24	We would like to thank Vice

President Paula Wolff and Board Members Nanette
 Doorley and Mareilé Cusack for their service to
 the Police Board.

VICE PRESIDENT TERRY: Thank you so much,
Commissioner Presley.

6 The next order of business is the 7 Noncitizen Advisory Council. Commissioner 8 Navarijo will provide an update.

COMMISSIONER NAVARIJO: Thank you. 9 The Commission will be opening up the application for 10 its Noncitizen Advisory Council soon. 11 The Noncitizen Advisory Council, or NAC, advises the 12 Commission on a number of public safety matters 13 to ensure their perspectives and experiences of 14 Chicago residents who are not U.S. citizens are 15 16 reflected and incorporated into the Commission's 17 work. Anyone can apply if you are a Chicago resident who's not a U.S. citizen or 18 undocumented, or if you work on behalf of Chicago 19 residents who are not U.S. citizens. 20 The Commission will be sharing more information about 21 22 the application process in the next couple of 23 weeks.

24 VICE PRESIDENT TERRY: Thank you,

1 Commissioner Navarijo.

The next order of business is a 2 review of the confidentiality of closed meetings. 3 The Open Meetings Act says to each 4 -- that each public body must review closed 5 meeting -- session minutes at the later -- at the 6 later of six months from the date of the last 7 review of the closed session minutes. At such 8 meetings, a determination shall be made and 9 reported in an open session that, one, the need 10 for confidentiality still exists as to all or 11 12 part of those minutes, or, two, that the minutes 13 or portions thereof no longer require confidential treatment and are available for 14 public inspection. 15 As a result of that review, we have 16 17 determined that closed meeting minutes for the following meetings shall remain confidential: 18 September 18th, 2023; March 21, July 12th, 19 September 6th, and September 20th. 20 The next order of business is 21 22 traffic stops update from myself and Commissioner 23 Gottlieb. So the Independent Monitor for the 24

1 Chicago Police Department Consent Decree has 2 recommended that traffic stops be included in the 3 Consent Decree. That would give the Illinois 4 Attorney General and the Independent Monitor a 5 role in reviewing traffic stop policy and in 6 potentially making changes to traffic stop 7 policy.

8 The Commission's view is that if 9 traffic stops are included in the Consent Decree, 10 the Commission must play a significant role; that 11 would include a significant role in exploring any 12 potential changes to CPD policy related to 13 traffic stops.

The Independent Monitor recently 14 issued recommendations saying that traffic stops 15 should be included in the Consent Decree and 16 17 agreeing with the Commission's position that the Commission should then play a significant role. 18 The Commission has established an 19 ad hoc working group consisting of myself and 20 Commissioner Gottlieb to lead the discussions 21 22 related to how we will retain CCPSA policymaking 23 authority if and/or when the matter is incorporate related into the Consent Decree. 24

As part of this process, the 1 2 Commission has provided a detailed plan regarding what our role in the Consent Decree process 3 should be to CPD, the City Department of Law, and 4 Illinois Office of Attorney General. 5 We held a meeting with the City of 6 7 Department of Law and the Illinois Office of Attorney General earlier this month to discuss 8 that plan. Those conversations are still 9 ongoing, and we are advocating for a series of 10 meetings in November and December so that all 11 12 parties can resolve whether traffic stops will be 13 incorporated into the Consent Decree, and if so, what exactly the Commission's role will be. 14 15 COMMISSIONER GOTTLIEB: As we continue our discussions about traffic stops, we want to 16 17 ensure that our input is entered into the community and its experiences. 18 The Commission will continue its 19 extensive community engagement process regarding 20 traffic stops with a dedicated listening session 21

in December. This and future listening sessions
will be held in different areas throughout the
City, with an emphasis placed on communities

where the data indicate that traffic stops happen
 disproportionately compared to other areas in the
 City.

Additionally, this working group, 4 along with Commission staff, has been analyzing 5 and synthesizing the best research available to 6 7 identify national traffic stops best practices to assess how CPD's practices compare. 8 This information, combined with the feedback we 9 received directly from the community and the 10 Commission, will be used to identify all the 11 12 Commission's options for the paths forward regarding traffic stops. We will use the 13 information to consider potential policy changes, 14 potential goals for the CPD Superintendent for 15 16 next year, potential language incorporating 17 traffic stops into the Consent Decree, and any other traffic stops related actions that we may 18 want to consider. 19

20 We are advocating for a quick 21 turnaround on this, meaning that by the end of 22 the year, we want to have clarity about the plan 23 for getting traffic stops into the Consent Decree 24 and the Commission's role in that work.

As soon as those issues are 1 2 resolved, we want to work towards next actions. 3 We will be providing updates regarding the Commission's work on traffic stops 4 at all our meetings. 5 6 VICE PRESIDENT TERRY: Are there any questions related to this? 7 COMMISSIONER WORTHAM: Yes. So I'd just like 8 to add a comment to the narrative on traffic 9 stops. I want to be super clear -- and I am 10 speaking for myself only -- that this Commission 11 12 has not made a decision, nor have we taken a

public vote, that we are moving to change CPD's traffic stop policy. I think there is a little bit of confusion about that, so I want that to be super clear.

17 Also, as we reach out for public comment and input related to traffic stops, again 18 speaking for myself, I would like to encourage 19 anyone, be they in this room or watching this 20 video, that when we say "community input," it 21 22 doesn't mean one specific perspective. So if you, for instance, happen to be a person who has 23 seen traffic stops be a useful tool to police in 24

your community, we want your feedback, too, and I want to make sure that's super clear as we endeavor on these public listening sessions on traffic stops, and any decision on traffic stop policy will be made publicly via vote from this body.

7 VICE PRESIDENT TERRY: Thank you,
8 Commissioner Wortham.

9 Are there any other questions or 10 comments related to this topic?

11 The next order of business is an 12 update regarding the prohibitions -- prohibited 13 associations within the Chicago Police

14 Department.

15 So, Commissioner Minor, 16 Commissioner Navarijo, and I spoke with Deputy 17 Mayor Garien Gatewood earlier this month on the 18 work that the Office of Community Safety has been 19 doing to prevent extremism in the Chicago Police 20 Department's rank.

Deputy Mayor Gatewood informed Commissioners that his office was working with the Office of Equity and Racial Justice to determine the administration's next step. Deputy Mayor Gatewood agreed to include the Commission in those discussions moving forward.

Commissioners Minor and I will also 4 be attending a town hall on November 10th to 5 speak on a panel discussing the work that the 6 7 Commission has done to address this issue of extremism in the Chicago Police Department. 8 Next, Commissioner Wortham will 9 provide an update from the CPD policy working 10 group. 11

12 COMMISSIONER WORTHAM: Thank you. So 13 Commissioner Terry and I have been working on the 14 Chicago Police Department Policy Workgroup.

15 We've been working with Chicago Police Department

16 on several policies, both already implement --

17 one already implemented -- two already

18 implemented, one in draft.

19 So start with GO1-11, which is the 20 policy that clarifies the Chicago Police 21 Department's relationship with the CCPSA and the 22 related engagement with CCPSA and Chicago Police 23 Department. So we've been going back and forth 24 with drafts. We received the most recent draft

from the Chicago Police Department on September 1 2 17th. We then gathered feedback on that. Commissioner Terry and I had an opportunity to 3 meet with District Councilors at their quarterly 4 meeting and talk through feedback from District 5 Councilors on this general order, which was 6 7 really helpful, and we really appreciate all that feedback. 8

9 So we then met with the Chicago 10 Police Department and are just waiting for their 11 response to our response. So once we get that 12 draft, we will meet again to try and refine the 13 policy and get this finalized.

Also, in addition to the GO1-11, 14 there is a resource guide developed with this 15 policy that will be a training guide for the 16 17 District Councilors -- sorry about that -- and the district command staff just to, again, kind 18 of give a guide for how the relationship works, 19 expectations for both sides, and hopefully make 20 things move smoothly and be effective per our 21 mission here. 22

23 We also have requested from the 24 Chicago Police Department information about the

implementation of GO8-03, that's the prohibition 1 on criminal and biased associations, which the 2 Interim Commission did a lot of work on to get 3 implemented in or go into effect in June of 2024. 4 So once we have an opportunity to 5 meet with the Department on that, Commissioner 6 7 Terry and I will discuss any feedback or, you know, what we're able to share. 8 So we understand the implementation 9 of that general order. 10 And then, finally, we are also 11 12 reviewing GO8-06, which is the prohibition on sexual misconduct, the policy suite on Police 13 Encounters and the Fourth Amendment, and the 14 policy suite on Gang and Narcotics-Related 15 16 Loitering. We are looking at that order -- that 17 suite of orders, as well, to figure out both what feedback we might want to offer, as well as how 18 that suite of general orders plays into a lot of 19 discussions that we're having on other issues in 20 the community. Questions or comments? Thank you 21 22 VICE PRESIDENT TERRY: Thank you, 23 Commissioner Wortham.

24 Are there any questions, comments?

(NO RESPONSE.) 1 2 VICE PRESIDENT TERRY: All right. Next, I will provide an update on the CPD budget. 3 So the Commission received CPD's 4 proposed 2025 budget today and has begun 5 reviewing the proposed budget for our annual 6 report and recommendations. A representative 7 from CPD will be presenting on their budget 8 priorities at the Commission's November meeting, 9 so make sure you are in attendance. 10 If you have any feedback on CPD's 11 12 2025 budget or how the Department should be prioritizing its spending, please use the QR code 13 to share your thoughts. I'm gathering it's 14 behind me. Yes, it's there. Please use the QR 15 16 code. Share your thoughts with the Commission. 17 So are there any questions from the Commission related to this topic? 18 (NO RESPONSE.) 19 VICE PRESIDENT TERRY: Seeing no further 20 comments or questions, we will move on to our 21 22 next update, and I'm turning it over to Commissioner Presley. 23 24 COMMISSIONER PRESLEY: Thank you. As some of

you may know, tomorrow will serve as my last day 1 as a Commissioner with the Commission for Public 2 Safety and Accountability. Yep, I think it's 3 important to say that I fully applied for this 4 position and took this position with the intent 5 to serve out my whole term, but I will say that 6 7 God sometimes laughs at your plans, and he did. And so I moved outside of the City earlier this 8 I'm so grateful to have worked with this 9 month. Commission and our staff. 10 I will tell you from experience, 11 12 these people work incredibly hard behind the The work they do is certainly -- doesn't 13 scenes. go unnoticed on our part, but maybe goes 14 unnoticed from the public. 15 So I want to give public credit to 16 17 our Commission staff and our Commissioners because they are incredible in the work that they 18 do in order to prepare for these meetings and 19 prepare to push those goals forward is really 20 significant. 21

I consider it an honor to have been appointed this Commission. I consider it a greater honor to have the privilege to serve with

this Commission. These people are really 1 dedicated. I think that they've made me a better 2 lawyer, a better person, a better advocate, and 3 they are really doing work to make this City 4 better for all of its residents. 5 I am sad to leave. I'm still 6 committed to the work, and I just want to say 7 thank you to my team and the Commission for their 8 support as I move on to this next chapter of my 9 life. Thank you. 10 VICE PRESIDENT TERRY: 11 Thank you, 12 Commissioner Presley. You know we are so saddened by your departure, but we will 13 definitely miss you and definitely going to miss 14 my west side sister. West side all day. 15 16 But I do want to give the floor to 17 any other Commissioners if you have any questions or anything you want to say. 18 COMMISSIONER WORTHAM: I promised, 19 Commissioner Presley, that I was going to cry in 20 public today about this. I'm not going to guite 21 22 cry. Seriously, I will say this is a loss for I actually do believe it is a loss for the 23 us. Commission. I believe it is a loss for the City. 24

But as I told Commissioner Presley privately, I will just say it publicly, you know, you got to live your life, you got to be happy and do what's right for you. I very much believe that for all of us.

And so as sad as I am to see you 6 go, you know I mean that, I'm very happy for you 7 because go live your life, girlfriend. Good 8 luck, and we will try very hard not to fill your 9 shoes because I don't think that's realistic, but 10 to find a good person to step into your shoes. 11 12 Congratulations and thank you for everything that you've done in this very short time for us and 13 for the City. I appreciate it. 14

15 COMMISSIONER GOTTLIEB: Yeah, so -- yeah, so, 16 this isn't always the case, but I agree 17 wholeheartedly with Commissioner Wortham. Don't 18 get used to it.

19 COMMISSIONER WORTHAM: Don't worry. I'm okay20 with that.

21 COMMISSIONER GOTTLIEB: I think this is 22 definitely a loss, Commissioner Presley, and 23 we'll definitely miss you. But I agree, like, 24 ultimately this just seems, like, an incredible opportunity for you, and that's what's most important. So despite how much we're going to miss you and your voice, I'm just grateful that you have this opportunity for yourself. So anyway...

COMMISSIONER NAVARIJO: Thank you for your 6 mentorship. As I was coming on board, you made 7 yourself available. Goes to speak to the type of 8 leadership that you brought to this Commission. 9 And, yeah, I want to echo what everybody else is 10 saying. I'm happy that you're going to be happy. 11 12 And we won't forget. But, yeah, just thank you for being so open. Oh, yeah, good luck to you. 13 COMMISSIONER MINOR: Commissioner Presley, I 14 just want to say you definitely will be missed. 15 I feel like I found a big sister in you, 16 17 honestly. You are an amazing collaborator, and I am definitely sad to see you go, but I am super 18 excited to see you flourish. Honestly, I really 19 appreciate you for trying to -- always trying to 20 make yourself available to get the work done. 21 I 22 know that it's difficult sometimes on the 23 Commission to balance all of the things that we

24 do, especially for our lawyers, because you're

1 lawyers, right? But also in the space.

2 So I just want to say I appreciate 3 your commitment and your availability. Thank 4 you, and you will be missed.

5 VICE PRESIDENT TERRY: Earlier today, we did 6 give Commissioner Presley a certificate of 7 service so she will always remember us. Please 8 give her another round of applause. We really 9 are going to miss her. Thank you so much. So 10 now I have to get back to business.

So with Commissioner Presley's 11 12 resignation from the Commission, that means it creates a vacancy. And so Commissioner Presley 13 fulfilled two key legal requirements for the 14 Commission, meeting the requirement of having a 15 minimum of ten years as a practicing attorney 16 17 with significant experience in civil rights, civil liberties, or criminal law, and 18 representing the west side of Chicago as mandated 19 by the Commission's geographic residency 20 requirements. 21

The Nominating Committee is accepting applications until November 6th, 2024. After the deadline, the Committee will thoroughly review all submissions, conduct interviews with selected finalists, and nominate at least two individuals for the vacancy on the Commission. Once nominated, the Mayor will select one individual to serve on the Commission from those nominated by the Committee.

Is there any further business beforethe Commission?

COMMISSIONER GOTTLIEB: All right. So I just 4 5 want to -- so as part of the community engagement work group, one thing we've been working on is 6 7 increasing our communication back and forth with District Councilors, and I see some District 8 Councilors here, and I want to acknowledge that. 9 But also through that increased communication, 10 it's become readily -- I already feel like I knew 11 12 this, but has become readily apparent to me how important the work of District Councilors is and 13 how great a job they are doing, and how difficult 14 the challenges are, depending on where you are in 15 16 the City. So I want to lift that up. And I'm 17 looking forward to our continued collaboration.

18 COMMISSIONER WORTHAM: So we did not plan 19 this, but this is actually kind of related. It 20 is going to be a different road on the same 21 highway. So we took some votes tonight on 22 District Council vacancies. We all voted the way 23 we believe best serves the residents of the 24 Chicago. I'm sure that's what my fellow

Commissioners did. But it was important for me 1 to say this. You know, I'm sure this is not the 2 last time we will be tasked with filling 3 vacancies because life happens, District 4 Councilors, you know, will maybe not serve their 5 It's really important to me to say this. 6 term. 7 There is no monopoly on perspective for this Commission or for our District Councils. 8 I will be super frank, because that's who I am. 9 When we come to our meetings and public comment, we 10 generally hear one perspective on things, which 11 12 is fine, because I respect your perspective. What I really would like to make sure residents 13 of Chicago know, even if they are not sitting in 14 this room, but I am so glad we filled all of our 15 16 meetings, is that you don't have to have a 17 certain perspective to be a part of this work. To be frank, you can be a supporter of law 18 enforce ment, you can a supporter of the Chicago 19 Police Department and believe they are a very 20 vital function of our public safety 21 22 infrastructure and apply for the District Council, and apply for the Commission were we to 23 have a vacancy. 24

I just really wanted to say that, 1 because I know we took votes, and people might 2 wonder why people vote a different way. 3 If I look at the ordinance, which I 4 brought so I could make sure I was really 5 specific, under the District Council portion of 6 the Ordinance 8-1, the purpose of District 7 Council is to, one, build connections between the 8 police and the communities. The police are the 9 members of our Chicago Police Department. 10 So when I am voting on vacancies, I 11 12 am looking for people who enter this work with a willingness to meet the goal, and that is the 13 number one goal. And, of course, there are other 14 things. All of you know my other number one goal 15 16 is public safety. 17 So I am looking for people who regardless of their perspective are willing to do 18 the work to do that. 19 And so I just want anyone who ever 20 hears me say this, you don't have to believe what 21 22 you hear on the public comment, or you can believe what you hear on the public comment. 23 All are welcome to this work if you 24

believe we deserve a safer City, because that's
what I'm looking for when I vote for people who
apply for vacancies. And it was very important
for me to say that tonight. So thank you.
COMMISSIONER NAVARIJO: Thank you,
Commissioner Wortham.
I just have a couple -- some things

8 were marinating in my head while we were -- is
9 this working?

Some things were marinating in my 10 head. First of all, a comment regarding the 11 12 extremism policy. The background of my work has been really on the ground working in different 13 wards and different districts, and one of the 14 things that I hear a lot from officers is that 15 they feel as if this policy goes against their 16 17 ability to politically be active, and I just want to say that extremism affects all spectrums and 18 politics. It doesn't have a particular side. 19 Extremism affects the integrity of institutions 20 and to the members of which they're willing to 21 22 serve in an equitable and equal way. 23

23 So I just want to say that 24 extremism isn't just one particular side of a 1 political spectrum.

The second thing that I had was I'd 2 3 be curious to know from the community policing perspective on how is it that mechanisms of 4 outreach toward District Councils are done. And 5 I say that because it depends -- I feel like the 6 strength of that outreach depends on the strength 7 of each individual CAPS office and some are 8 stronger than others. And so how we're making 9 sure that we're measuring in a way that we can 10 give best practices maybe to some of those 11 12 districts that don't have strong engagement or outreach strategies. 13

14 So those are the only comments that 15 I had that were marinating in my head. I just 16 wanted those to be on the record. Thank you.

VICE PRESIDENT TERRY: Thank you, all. Okay.
Is there any further business before the
Commission?
