PRESIDENT DRIVER: Commissioner Driver is 1 present. Commissioner Gottlieb. 2 COMMISSIONER GOTTLIEB: Present. 3 PRESIDENT DRIVER: Commissioner Minor. 4 5 COMMISSIONER MINOR: Present. 6 PRESIDENT DRIVER: Commissioner Presley. someone on the Commission or someone on the Commission staff.

People who wanted to speak during the public comment period were asked to submit their names in writing earlier today. Names were drawn at random by a member of the Commission staff. Speakers will be called in the order in which their names were drawn. If your name is called to offer public comment, we ask you to approach the microphone and line up in the order in which the names were drawn.

If for any reason you are unable to come to the microphone, please flag a member of our staff so a microphone can be brought to you. When it is your turn to speak, please state your name and spell your name, then offer your comments. Each speaker will have two minutes. We've allotted a total of 20 minutes for public comment.

First speaker is (Inaudible).

UNKNOWN SPEAKER: Congratulations, all of you. Welcome to CCPSA, and I'm looking forward to embarking on this new relationship body. I just have a couple of things, tidbits. Please

engage with District Councilors, especially in your district. And I know it's a big ask because everybody's -- but try to attend some of the District Council meetings, not for invitation, but try to show up at the meeting. And -- that's all I can think of right now. But, again, welcome. Congratulations.

UNKNOWN SPEAKER: Thank you. I encourage you all to -- Superintendent Snelling that should reopen -- or he should listen to -- I'm part of an organization Southern Poverty Law Center. And we -- we wrote a letter to the City about the failed investigation from BIA, and I hope some of you read it. If not -- so it's a failure for a couple of reasons. The biggest thing is that the investigators at BIA did not apparently know that an archived version of the Oath Keepers website exists, and that they could compare what those -- that website said at a time when the officers were joining, instead of just accepting the word of the officer.

The BIA did not investigate an individual, a fellow officer, who told the other eight officers -- or a number of the eight

officers about the Oath Keepers. BIA failed to 1 2 investigate or even talk to people like that fellow officer, but also anybody outside of that 3 organization. They did not talk to anybody, no 4 experts at the ADL who leaked the list, no 5 experts at the SPLC and other organizations that 6 look into this matter. And the most important 7 thing is BIA really failed to -- really ignored 8 how Oath Keepers participated in the group, and 9 the accused actually talk about how they 10 participated in the group in their -- in their 11 12 interviews with BIA. Some of the things that they did, go to shooting competitions. A couple 13 of other things they did, go to gun shows. 14 This is how you participated as an Oath Keeper. 15 16 So I'm just encouraging you to look 17 at our letter SPLC wrote to get a little bit more information on why this investigation failure to 18 push -- as well as to push Superintendent 19 Snelling to think about BIA's investigation. 20 21

PRESIDENT DRIVER: Thank you.

MS. MIJANA: My name is Faayani Aboma Mijana. You have the spelling up there, but it's F-A-A-Y-A-N-I, A-B-O-M-A, M-I-J-A-N-A. I'm a

member of the Chicago Alliance against Racism and Political Oppression, and I'm a resident of the 14th District where one of the officers named in the Oath Keeper roster is a sergeant in my district, and residents of my district, including myself and our District Councilor, have been horrified to learn about the Oath Keeper ties of this officer.

And we're very well aware about the policy that the CCPSA passed -- the interim CCPSA, and we think that the BIA's so-called investigation where officers were interviewed for no more than 30, 40 minutes is a mockery of this Commission that the people established. It is a mockery of, you know, the democratic process. And so I'm here to lend my support as a member of the Alliance and a resident of the 14th District where this officer is for, you know, putting forward an investigation in another arm, because we cannot trust the police. The police themselves, they've shown us time and time again that they can't do it. And so, you know, we're putting forth the demand that be put somewhere else with the OIG. So thank you.

PRESIDENT DRIVER: Thank you.

Our next speaker is Grace Patino.

MS. PATINO: Hi. My name is Grace. I'm a member of the Chicago Alliance Against Racism and Political Oppression.

Hi again. I'm with CAARPO. I'm also a resident of the 17th District, which is where another one of the identified officers with ties to the Oath Keepers works.

In less than a 20-minute interview with the BIA, an officer in 17 -- you know, a less than 20-minute interview is deficient.

Retamozo is an officer with a sordid past. He has a past incident where he wrongly arrested a black man for drugs that did not belong to him. Took money from the victim and failed to inventory or return the money, conducted a strip search without prior written approval from the watch commander, and failed to document on the arrest report that a strip search was conducted on the victim.

In layman's terms, that sounds a lot like planting drugs on someone and sexually assaulting them. Instead of Retamozo's

higher-ups holding him accountable, the sergeant at the time allegedly then kicked the victim in the groin, threatened to kill the victim, and directed profanities at him.

As a result of a complaint being filed about this -- and this was back in 2007 -- Retamozo was suspended for one day.

So based on stories like that, I don't see how we're supposed to trust the police to investigate themselves with this Oath Keeper business.

The entire point of the creation of the ECPS ordinance was to prevent another Laquan McDonald, another Rekia Boyd, or Adam Toledo. We need the CCPSA's help to make this work, and we need all of our District Councilors to make this work.

I'm calling on you all, the newly appointed CCPSA, my District Councilors in the 17th, and all District Councilors in the City to demand the investigation into the Oath Keepers be reopened, and really for all of these officers associated to be fired.

We also need the names and

complaint histories of all officers working in the 17th District, a request that the sergeant denied of one of my District Councilor, and we need an end to the racist tact teams, pretextual traffic stops. Dexter Reed should still be here today. And we want to know what you all are going to do to ensure another execution doesn't happen.

PRESIDENT DRIVER: Is there anybody virtually? I see a David signed up. Is he a virtual? Is he ready? Let's go ahead.

MR. ORLIKOFF: Thank you. My name is David Orlikoff. I'm an elected District Councilor in the 14th District serving Humboldt Park, Logan Square, surrounding areas.

I'm not exactly sure what the investigation to be voted on today pertains. I tried to ask about that and have not heard. But I can only assume that since OIG already did an investigation report on the BIA's investigation itself and the policy passed by CCPSA, that the request is that OIG do an investigation into the individual officers known to be Oath Keeper members. I do support that definitely.

There are grave issues with the lack of investigation conducted by BIA, notably Timothy Moore, the Deputy Director of the Bureau of Internal Affairs, said that the probe was not deficient but specifically he said, None of the accused members stated that they had knowledge that the Oath Keepers were a violent extremist group, nor did they state that they had intentions of joining a violent extremist group.

So, we had warned you, a lot of people, that this would happen, this exact thing. And that's why, in general, BIA cannot retain jurisdiction over this policy.

Certainly the bare minimum for BIA having jurisdiction over a policy would be that there is a public list of groups that are banned, and that the public is aware of that. The fact that BIA fought for this to be private and conducted in private shows that they cannot be trusted, as well as the outcome that we received. But that amounts to them saying unless the officers tell us to our face that they are racist, they will stay on the force. That is absurd.

You know, this has done so much damage to the City already. And BIA needs to lose jurisdiction, not just in this case, but in all cases at least similar to this.

According to the deputy -according to Deborah Witzburg of the Office of
Inspector General, even a member of the Klu Klux
Klan can now join CPD, so long as they are not
telling officers they are racist, so long as
there aren't other information about that. So
this is a step backward, and it needs to be
rectified not in just these eight cases but all
cases. BIA cannot retain jurisdiction while
serving racist officers. Thanks.

PRESIDENT DRIVER: Thank you. We've reached the end of our public comment period. Thank you, again, to all of our speakers. We value your input.

The next order of business is new business. The Community Commission for Public Safety and Accountability has received information from multiple knowledgeable sources that raise serious concerns about the operation of the Civilian Office of Police Accountability.

The Commission has oversight authority over COPA.

The information we have received concerns the quality of integrity of COPA's investigations, the quality and integrity of COPA's disciplinary recommendations, and retaliation against COPA employees who have raised concerns about COPA's investigations and recommendations.

The Commission has received complaints from multiple, credible sources, and the information they have provided is consistent. Considering the importance of civilian oversight and the work that COPA does, we take these complaints very seriously.

Due to the nature of the complaints, we want to ensure that they are investigated.

Because the Commission isn't an investigative body, we will be voting later tonight on whether to take the information we have received, share it with the Office of the Inspector General, and recommend that the Office of Inspector General conduct a fair, thorough, and timely audit and investigation.

The Office of Inspector General's

mission is to promote economy, effectiveness, efficiency, and integrity by identifying corruption, waste, and mismanagement in city government.

The Office of Inspector General conducts investigations, audits of City programs, and operations, and reviews of City programs, operations, and policies. Based on its inquiries, the Office of Inspector General can issue reports on its findings and make recommendations.

Under the Commission's ordinance, if the Commission recommends an Inspector General audit, the Public Safety Inspector General must respond to the Commission within ten business days.

If the Inspector General conducts an inquiry, we believe that under the Inspector General's ordinance, the Commission would receive a copy of the Inspector General's final report and recommendations, and then based on the report and recommendations, the Commission can determine whether any further Commission action is proper.

COMMISSIONER PRESLEY: In taking this vote,

we want to emphasize that this vote does not mean that the Commission is taking a position on the strength or accuracy of the information that has been brought to us. It is an acknowledgement that the allegations are serious and credible, and that the Commission doesn't have the investigative tools to assess as well as is necessary whether the allegations are accurate, and that the information we received should be reviewed by the body that is in the best position and has the best tools and resources to assess the strength and accuracy of the information and to make appropriate findings and recommendations.

COMMISSIONER GOTTLIEB: The community must have full confidence in the quality and integrity of COPA's investigations. I fully support the role COPA plays as an independent civilian body.

I also believe that we are taking this step because we appreciate the hugely important role that COPA must play. We are committed to COPA's success, and we believe that a fair and thorough investigation will help us understand the steps that must be taken to ensure that COPA succeeds in its mission.

Our goal is for fair-minded people to be able to trust COPA's effectiveness and integrity, and if an investigation reveals serious issues, we need a road map for what COPA

needs to do to earn that trust.

COMMISSIONER WORTHAM: Commissioner Wortham here. So it was my understanding when we approved this special meeting, that we were doing so to entertain the motion as Commissioner Driver articulated, not to offer any opinions as to our value of COPA (AUDIO GLITCH) the purpose that we approve this meeting, which is voting on the motion and not expressing my individual opinions today about COPA or civilian oversight. I will reserve those for a time where we've articulated that as our purpose.

PRESIDENT DRIVER: Thank you, Commissioners.
