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VICE PRESIDENT TERRY: So the September 26th 1 2 meeting of the Community Commission for Public Safety and Accountability is called to order at 3 7:13 p.m. 4 I'm going to lead us in the roll 5 call. So we will begin by calling the roll to 6 establish a quorum. 7 Commissioner Gottlieb. 8 COMMISSIONER GOTTLIEB: Present. 9 VICE PRESIDENT TERRY: Commissioner Driver. 10 Commissioner Minor. 11 12 COMMISSIONER MINOR: Present. VICE PRESIDENT TERRY: Commissioner Presley. 13 COMMISSIONER PRESLEY: Present. 14 VICE PRESIDENT TERRY: Commissioner Terry is 15 16 present. 17 Commissioner Wortham. With four members of the Community 18 Commission for Public Safety and Accountability 19 present, we have a quorum, and we can conduct the 20 Commission's business. 21 22 The next item of business is public If you would like to share something 23 related to the Commission's work on public safety 24

and accountability, you have a few options. You can speak at a public meeting such as this. You can also submit public comment in writing by emailing your comment to the CommunityCommissionPublicComment@CityofChicago. org, or you can bring a copy of your comment to one of the Commission's public meetings and give it to someone on the Commission or someone on the Commission staff.

People who wanted to speak during the public comment period tonight were asked to submit their names in writing. Names were drawn at random by a member of the Commission staff. Speakers will be called in the order in which their names were drawn. If your name is called to offer public comment, we ask you approach the microphone and line up in the order that your name is called. When it's your turn to speak, please say your name then spell your name, then offer your comments. Each speaker will have two minutes. We have allotted 20 minutes for public comment.

So our members -- so the first virtual comment we have is Grace Patino. Grace

isn't there.

The next person we have for public comment is Brian Young, Junior.

The last person we have for virtual comments, Maurice Woodard.

So for those in-person comments, we have Beth Rochford, Jasmine Smith, and Amika Tendaji. If you all can line up in the order that your names were called to provide your public comment. You each will be provided two minutes.

MS. ROCHFORD: Elizabeth, traditional spelling, Rochford, R-O-C-H-F-O-R-D. I'm a 17th District Councilor, and I wanted -- we had a meeting last week Thursday, and the community asked me to bring two things forward. They want to know what the next steps are for the traffic stop -- rewriting of that policy. They want to eliminate tact teams, and they wanted to know the status of joining with the Mayor's Office to look into what are the plans for making sure that there are not Oath Keepers or other officers who are still part of extremist groups. And I know we have talked about it in the past, that you

guys were doing some kind of a task force with the Mayor's Office. So we'd just like an update on what's happening with that. Thank you.

VICE PRESIDENT TERRY: Thank you.

MS. SMITH: Good evening, everyone, Activist Jasmine Smith, Chicago Alliance Against Racial and Political Oppression. I'm multitasking right now, but I just want to come and congratulate that we finally have a full City Council, despite the fact that one is leaving, but still have a full -- I mean not City Council, Community Commission for Public Safety and Accountability. And I just want to ask that -- and I know you can't ask questions, but I'm hoping we can get an update soon in regards to what's the move and plan going to be regarding pretextual traffic stops.

I know that there was a special meeting that was had in regards to that, and we thank you guys for that. But keeping that at the top of y'all's to-do list. But just want to get a sooner update or, you know, where the roads lead to in regard to that, because it's still very important, as you guys can see.

It seems like the police is getting more and more loose and reckless with these traffic stops, and these killings against innocent people that shouldn't be killed by a simple traffic stop or by just a simple encounter with them.

So we'd definitely like to get some of the things that protect them or just giving them the urge to do the things that they do without any accountability or repercussions. And I just wanted to say that.

Thank you, guys, and keep up the great work, and we pushing for the referendum, y'all, to give this body more power right now.

VICE PRESIDENT TERRY: Thank you.

UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Hi. We are pushing for a referendum to give this body more power. We also --

VICE PRESIDENT TERRY: Name, please.

MS. TENDAJI: My name is Amika Tendaji. We are pushing for this body -- for the referendum for the this body -- to give this body more power. But we urgently need this body to take up the work of ending pretextual stops. Being a

Chicagoan with the police behind you just in general, it is a mental health crisis. I'm terrified for myself. I'm terrified for my community. I'm terrified for my children.

Board hearing where I watched police exhibit their tendency to just straight up lie. People were told that the meeting was over; they were not allowed in. It is a public meeting.

Revolving door is barred. People were turned around, lied to, condescending, and there's not even an understanding of these are working people who may not be able to get to that meeting exactly on time. There are some disabled folks in that meeting, like me, who might need the help and support of somebody leaving out.

There are also families that are singing happy birthday to their loved one who should be here that was taken out by police, right? So maybe somebody needs some assistance from the community to get on out of that meeting.

Reginald Clay's family at the Police Board meeting singing happy birthday and crying tears. He was killed in a foot pursuit.

David Curry was just killed in a foot pursuit. And this is happening in the same ward, my ward, where Alderman David Moore is trying so hard to keep ShotSpotter, an investigation of the harm that that contract has done, and why we end up with these expensive contracts, like the predatory parking is preying on my community which results in parking tickets, boots, and another mental health crisis, in addition to loss of work.

So we need investigations into what happened with David Curry, what's the drag on the Consent Decree.

VICE PRESIDENT TERRY: We've reached the end of public comment period. Thank you, again, to all the speakers. We do value your input.

The next order of business is the approval of the minutes. Before today's meeting, draft minutes of the Commission's regular meeting held on July 25th and August 14th and special meetings held on July 15th, August 14th, August 27th were shared with all Commissioners.

Are there any corrections to the draft minutes that have been circulated?

(NO RESPONSE.) 1 VICE PRESIDENT TERRY: If there are no corrections, I move to approve the minutes. 3 COMMISSIONER PRESLEY: Second. 4 5 VICE PRESIDENT TERRY: I have moved to approve the minutes of the Commission meeting 6 held on the aforementioned dates. Commissioner 7 Presley has seconded. Is there any debate on the 8 motion? 9 (NO RESPONSE.) 10 VICE PRESIDENT TERRY: Hearing none, we will 11 12 move to the vote. Those in favor of adopting the motion to approve minutes of the Commission's 13 meeting held on the aforementioned dates, please 14 15 say aye. 16 (CHORUS OF AYES.) 17 VICE PRESIDENT TERRY: Those opposed, please 18 say nay. (NO RESPONSE.) 19 VICE PRESIDENT TERRY: All right. The ayes 20 have it. The motion carries. 21 Our next order of business will be 22

new business. The next item is the approval of a

series of closed meetings. Section 2(c)(3) of

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the Illinois Open Meetings Act allows the Commission to meet in closed session to consider the following subjects: The selection of a person to fill a public office, as defined in this Act, including a vacancy in a public office, when the public body is given power to appoint under law or ordinance, or the discipline, performance, or removal of an occupant of a public office, when the public body is given power to remove the occupant under law or ordinance.

Section 2(a) of the Act authorizes the Commission to take a vote to hold a series of closed meetings over the course of not more than three months from today and only for the purposes cited under Section 2(c)(3).

Over the next few months, the

Commission may need to meet in closed session for reasons that are allowed under the Open Meetings

Act, including to discuss filling vacancies on the Police Board.

I move to hold a series of closed meetings to take place for the maximum period allowable as authorized by Section 2(c)(3) of the

Open Meetings Act. Is there a second? 1 COMMISSIONER GOTTLIEB: Second. VICE PRESIDENT TERRY: Commissioner Terry has 3 moved to hold a series of closed meetings to take 4 5 place for the maximum period allowable as authorized by Section 2(c)(3) of the Open 6 Meetings Act. Commissioner Gottlieb has 7 seconded. Is there debate on the motion? 8 (NO RESPONSE.) 9 VICE PRESIDENT TERRY: Hearing none, we will 10 move to a vote. Those in favor of holding a 11 12 series of closed meetings to take place for the maximum time period allowable as authorized by 13 Section 2(c)(3) of the Open Meetings Act, please 14 15 say aye. 16 (CHORUS OF AYES.) 17 VICE PRESIDENT TERRY: Those opposed, please say nay. 18 (NO RESPONSE.) 19 20 VICE PRESIDENT TERRY: The ayes have it, and the motion carries. 21 The Commission is authorized to 22 hold a series of closed meetings to take place 23 for the maximum time period allowable as 24

authorized by Section 2(c)(3) of the Open Meetings Act.

So now the next order of business will be reports and updates. We will begin by discussing working group updates.

First, we will -- first one will be the update from Commissioner Gottlieb of the COPA working group.

COMMISSIONER GOTTLIEB: Thank you, Commissioner Terry.

So, the COPA working group met with COPA Chief Administrator Kersten and her team on September 17th. The working group had the opportunity to meet with COPA's new director of mediation Daisha Muhammad.

COPA is working on a new program that allows someone who brings a complaint to COPA to meet with CPD, together with a trained, impartial community mediator, to see if there is a way to resolve the issue without a traditional COPA investigation.

The mediation program is only available for certain kinds of complaints. And the mediation process could only be used in

situations where both sides agree to mediation.

So, it would only be an option when someone who brings a complaint about a police officer wants to use the process.

And anyone who chooses mediation can decide to end it at any point.

And the mediation process only gets resolved if both sides agree to it.

If a case gets resolved through the mediation, then the complaint gets closed. The Commission, along with several District Councilors, are meeting with Director Muhammad in early October to learn more about the mediation program.

So in addition to the mediation program, at our last meeting, Chief Kersten and her team also informed the Commission that COPA has reached operational compliance with 90 percent of its obligations under the Consent Decree.

In October, the working group will meet to discuss updates to the 2024 goals and evaluations, covering work from July through September. At that meeting, Chief Kersten will

also provide an update on COPA'S Policy & 1 Research Division. 2 We will provide update on these items at the Commission's October meeting. 4 VICE PRESIDENT TERRY: 5 Thank you, Commissioner Gottlieb. 6 Are there any questions from the 7 Commission? 8 (NO RESPONSE.) 9 VICE PRESIDENT TERRY: Next we will have an 10 update from Commissioner Presley of the Police 11 12 Board working group. But before I turn it over to Commissioner Presley, I do want to acknowledge 13 and thank Alderman Matt O'Shea for being here. 14 also want to acknowledge our newly appointed 15 commissioner, which makes us a full Commission, 16 17 Angel Navarijo. And I also would like to acknowledge 18 the District Councilors who attend these meetings 19 20 who are represented across the city. Commissioner Presley. 21 COMMISSIONER PRESLEY: Thank you. 22 After engaging in a city-wide 23 community outreach effort, the Commission 24

received a record number of applications to fill 1 Police Board vacancies. Commissioners are in the process of reviewing applications and interviews will 4 begin shortly. 5 Next month, Commissioners will meet 6 with the Police Board leadership to review goals 7 and evaluations for 2024 and get ready for the 8 2025 goal process. 9 We will provide an update on these 10 items at the Commission's October meeting. 11 12 VICE PRESIDENT TERRY: Thank you, Commissioner Presley. 13 Are there any questions from the 14 Commission? 15 16 (NO RESPONSE.) 17 VICE PRESIDENT TERRY: Next will be an update from Commissioner Minor of the Community 18 Engagement working group. 19 COMMISSIONER MINOR: Good evening, everyone. 20 The Community Engagement working group has put 21 22 together a plan for expanding the Commission's community engagement in Chicago communities most 23

impacted by policing and public safety issues.

In phase one, the Commission will 1 2 be meeting with groups and organizations that focus on the following: Youth violence prevention and 4 Faith leaders. CVI/violence 5 outreach. 6 prevention groups. Justice impacted organization -- and justice impacted 7 organizations. 8 If there are any groups or 9 organizations you think the Commission should 10 meet with, please let CCPSA staff know or send an 11 12 email to myself or Commissioner Gottlieb. concludes my report. 13 VICE PRESIDENT TERRY: Thank you, 14 Commissioner Minor. 15 16 Are there any questions from 17 the Commission? (NO RESPONSE.) 18 VICE PRESIDENT TERRY: Next, I will provide 19 update from the CPD Policy working group. 20 So Commissioners received a revised 21 22 version of the General Order 01-11 on September 17th. GO1-11 is a new CPD policy that provides 23

direction and guidance about how CPD should work

with and support the CCPSA Commission and the District Councils.

Once CCPSA received the revised policy, we compared it with the original policy, and we checked that the new version incorporated the recommended changes that the Commissioners discussed with CPD.

CPD did incorporate some of the recommended changes but not all the changes.

The Commissioners will work with CPD to ensure necessary changes and feedback are incorporated.

We are meeting with CPD's Policy Research and Development team on October 1st with the following agenda: Resolve any outstanding concerns regarding G-11 -- GO1-11. Learn about the implementation of GO8-O3, which is the general order on prohibitions on criminal and bias-based organizations. The current policy has been in effect since April of 2024.

Commissioners will ask CPD about the training efforts related to this policy, including content, delivery method, and what percentage of CPD employees have been trained on

this new policy. 1 Commissioners will also request all the data related to any violations of this order. 3 Commissioners will inquire about 4 5 any additional organizations that have been added to any list maintained by the Bureau of 6 Counterterrorism. 7 Commissioners will also ask about 8 how CPD monitors their members' social media 9 activity, including: Fundraising/making personal 10 contributions to specific criminal or bias-based 11 12 organizations, posting, sharing, liking, following, or otherwise distributing or 13 redistributing content on social media. 14 The Commissioners will also compile 15 16 this information and update the community at an 17 upcoming Community Commission meeting. Are there any questions from the 18 Commission? 19 20 (NO RESPONSE.) VICE PRESIDENT TERRY: Next, we will update 21 22 on the CPD budget, and I'm going to turn it to Commissioner Gottlieb. 23 COMMISSIONER GOTTLIEB: So Commissioner 24

Driver and I attended a town hall on CPD's 2025

budget at St. Agnes of Bohemia with the

Little Village Community Council on September

18th.

We heard directly from the impacted

we heard directly from the impacted community members regarding their concerns about public safety in Little Village and how they think CPD should be prioritizing its spending.

Communities members were particularly concerned with increasing CPD's victim liaison services, including improving language access services, and with there being greater transparency in the budget around public safety spending.

The working group has also been working with the District Councils to collect each District's feedback on CPD's budget priorities.

The thoughts from the District

Councils will help inform how Commissioner Driver

and I plan to review CPD's proposed budget.

As the City's budget process moves into October, we look forward to reviewing CPD's proposed budget for next year and providing an

update on any recommendations that the Commission 1 makes of the Department at our next meeting. VICE PRESIDENT TERRY: Thank you, Commissioner Gottlieb. 4 Are there any questions from the 5 Commission? 6 (NO RESPONSE.) 7 VICE PRESIDENT TERRY: All right. So next is 8 an update on the CPD goals and evaluation, and 9 I'm turning it back over to Commissioner Minor. 10 11 COMMISSIONER MINOR: Thank you. 12 Commissioner Driver and I will be meeting with Superintendent Snelling and his staff next month 13 to discuss the Department's Quarter 3 goal 14 deliverables. 15 We look forward to hearing what 16 17 progress CPD has made to the 2024 goals, particularly interested in the workforce 18 allocation study goal, and training updates on 19 traffic stops, and we will provide further 20 updates on CPD goals at our next meeting. 21 22 The Commission will be assessing the status of the workforce allocation study, 23

which is laid out in both our 2024 CCPSA goals

for the Superintendent and also by City Council ordinance.

Two of community's questions on traffic stop updates, one portion of that is that under the 20 -- under the 2024 goals for the Police Superintendent, Superintendent Snelling has agreed to place a special focus on traffic stops in trainings on constitutional policing, and will do so in a manner that is guided by well-articulated, community-informed strategies.

The 2024 goal states that CPD practices must be data driven, effective, and mindful of equity issues.

As a part of its evaluation for 2024, the Commission will be looking for evidence about whether CPD goals -- I'm sorry -- CPD traffic stop practices will meet that description.

In addition to community's comments for BIA update. At the Commission's July monthly meeting, I addressed community's concerns and frustrations about BIA's investigation into the Oath Keepers investigations -- I'm sorry -- into the Oath Keepers allegations, the outcome of that

investigation, and BIA's subsequent decision not to reopen the investigation at the recommendation of the Inspector General.

One of my commitments to the public was that the Commission will -- will take a careful look into the Inspector General's recommendation for the mayoral task force that will, "Plan and implement a comprehensive, whole-of-government approach to preventing, identifying, and eliminating extremist and anti-government activities and associations within CPD."

The Commission has been working with Deputy Mayor Gatewood and the Office of Community Safety to schedule a conversation between myself, Commissioner Terry, and Deputy Mayor Gatewood to discuss the current status of the task force. I will continue to provide public updates on this as they become available. And I want to say thank you to the leadership of our Commission for their continued support and advocacy on this initiative.

VICE PRESIDENT TERRY: Thank you, Commissioner Minor.

Are there any questions from the 1 Commission? 2 (NO RESPONSE.) VICE PRESIDENT TERRY: Next I will provide an 4 update on traffic stops. 5 6 So as many of you know, the Independent Monitor for the CPD Consent Decree 7 has recommended that traffic stops be included in 8 the Consent Decree. That would give Illinois 9 Attorney General and the Independent Monitor a 10 role in reviewing traffic stop policy and 11 12 potentially in making changes to traffic stop policy. 13 The Commission's view is that if 14 traffic stops are included in the Consent Decree, 15 16 the Commission must play a significant role. 17 That will include a significant role in exploring any potential changes to CPD policy related to 18 traffic stops. 19 The Commission has a proposal for 20

The Commission has a proposal for how it could be included in this Consent Decree work. It would look a lot like the way the Commission now works on policy with CPD, and then it would include the Attorney General and the

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Independent Monitor in the same way they now work on policy under the Consent Decree.

We will be meeting soon with the Attorney General's Office, the Police Department, and the City's Department of Law to work towards an agreement about the Commission's role in the process if traffic stops are included in the Consent Decree.

We look forward to sitting down with all the parties to resolve these issues and begin this important work together.

The meeting should happen before the Commission's next meeting in October, and we will provide an update at that time if we have met.

Are there any questions from the Commission?

Seeing none, we will move to adjournment.
