Key Updates - Workforce Allocation Study

- Bottom Line: Not much progress!! We are feeling frustrated about this!
 - Contract still has not been signed by all parties; funders still need to sign on
 - CPD's quarterly update deadline has been missed
- We are taking the lead in pushing progress:
 - CCPSA Commissioners: promised a renewed focus because of our advocacy
 - Joyce Foundation: emailed our contact for more details
 - City Council: Making a public comment at tomorrow's Police and Fire Committee Meeting

Key Updates - CCPSA Nominating Committee

The Nominating Committee successfully advocated City Council to confirm Angel Rubi Navarijo as the next CCPSA Commissioner. City Council confirmed his seat 31-14 on Sept. 18, 2024.

Mr. Rubi Navarijo, at just 23 years old, brings a wealth of government and public safety experience. As an undocumented DACA recipient, Latino Commissioner, and Northsider, he brings needed diversity to the Commission.

Upcoming Vacancy

- Commissioner Kelly Pressley announced she will be stepping down from the Commission effective Oct. 31, 2024, due to moving out of Chicago.
- The Nominating Committee voted to open applications for the next Commissioner on/about **October 7, 2024.**
- To fulfill CCPSA Ordinance requirements, the Committee will be seeking:
 - A Westsider
 - who has been an attorney for 10+ years with significant defense,
 prosecution, civil rights, or civil liberties experience.
- Stay tuned for application posting. Application will be open for 30 days.

Key Updates - 988

Geo Routing has been added for T-Mobile and Verizon customers!!

This means: when you call 988 it will ping the nearest cell phone tower and connect you to the 988 answering center that is closest to where you are.

This is a HUGE improvement. AT&T is adding this service in the next several months.

Key Call Outs

Provide community quarterly updates on City's progress towards implementing and expanding alternative emergency response models (e.g. CARE, Treatment Not Trauma, mobile crisis response teams)

CARE Team Update:

- CPD and CFD will be rolling off the CARE team starting Sept. 27
- Completed a period of shadowing
- Will have to continue to make collaboration/relationship building between departments a priority

Alternative Crisis Response:

- Created a proposal that the Commission begin a conversation around alternative response in the City
- Working to gather support among DCs so it passes and become a Commission recommendation

Key Call-Outs

Establish a main point of contact within Third Party Organizations selected to execute WFA Study

- Met with Dr. Quintin Williams of The Joyce Foundation, organization responsible for funding the Workforce Allocation Study
- Discussed ways to form a working relationship to understand how our teams can work together to provide updates to the community and enroll our residents in the WFA scoping process

Key Call-Outs

12 Distribute 1,500 mental health palm cards to community members

- Distributed palm cards to unhoused neighbors living at the Wilson/Marine Dr. viaducts
- Have distributed over 750 palm cards to neighborhood businesses, community groups, community members, CPD officers/staff
- Created versions in Spanish and braille
- Creating an updated version with 988

CPD's 2024 Budget

\$1,998,869,599

- 2023 \$1,907,521,868
- \$91,347,731 (~5% increase)



CPD's 2024 Budget per Capita

\$736 spending per Chicagoan

2023 – \$708 per resident

Workforce Allocation

- Publish quarterly reports on:
 - Beat integrity
 - Response times
 - Unity of Command/Span of control
 - Number of sworn officers working in centralized units
 - Amount of overtime work
- Complete a Comprehensive Workforce Allocation Study to develop a data-driven strategy to allocate CPD resources



CCPSA's Budget Review & Recommendations

Community Policing

- Clearly define and articulate a comprehensive community policing strategy and roll it out city wide
- Fully staff the community policing efforts including administrative, supervisory, and civilian positions.
- Assess effectiveness by speaking with the community about their interactions with CPD.



Training & Leadership Development

- Better, more transparent information on training implementation:
 - Number of officers participating in trainings
 - Types/Amount of trainings
 - Number of instructors
 - Leadership training stats



Legal Judgements

- Develop a risk assessment plan to reduce repeated offenses and repeat offenders including opportunities for improved supervision and training.
- Review misconduct/use of force investigations to understand what is driving settlements



Infrastructure/Wellness

- Ensure that infrastructure and equipment are up to date and inviting
 - Quiet rooms/break rooms
 - Clean
 - Adequate lighting
 - Nursing rooms for mothers



CCPSA's Budget Review & Recommendations

Data Analytics/Technology

- Improve Department's ability to collect, store, analyze data
- Ensure data is high quality



Civilianization

 Increase civilian workforce so that sworn officers can spend more time patrolling beats

 Work with the City to add capacity for mental health clinician response when appropriate

Public Comment - Rules & Follow Up

Rules of Engagement

- 2 min/speaker = ~10 speakers (typically 20 minutes total)
- Request to make public comment must be submitted within 30-minutes of start of meeting
- Order of speakers randomly selected
- No disruption of speakers
- No harassment or disrespect will be tolerated (zero tolerance policy)

Follow Up

- Public comments are of utmost importance to DCMs
- DCMs and staff will take official minutes of public comments made
- DCMs may address comments in real time or may follow up with community member at a later time
