Are you a licensed attorney living on Chicago's West Side with a passion for public safety, police oversight, and accountability? Your opportunity to make a difference is here!



## Basic Qualifications for Vacant Position:

- Chicago residence for at least 5 years
- Lived in a West Side community area (as defined in ordinance) for at least 1 year
- At least 10 years as an attorney, with significant experience

Nominating Committee received 3 applications. Interviews are ongoing.

## What is the Community Commission?

The Community Commission for Public Safety and Accountability is a seven-member body that oversees the Chicago Police Department (CPD), the Civilian Office of Police Accountability (COPA), and the Police Board. The Commission works to increase public safety, transparency, and community input into CPD, COPA, and Police Board operations, policies, and procedures.

## What does the Commission do?

-  Plays central role in selecting and removing the Police Superintendent, Police Board members, and the COPA Chief Administrator
-  Sets Police Department Policy
-  Establishes goals and evaluates progress for the Police Department, COPA, and Police Board
-  Reviews the Police Department budget
-  Works with the Police Department on community policing programs
-  Identifies and recommends community-based, and evidence-based solutions to violence, including non-policing alternatives
-  Promotes community engagement and transparency

## Eligibility Requirements

*Immediate Vacancy for a West Side Attorney*

### Specialized Experience

Must be an attorney with a minimum of ten years as a practicing attorney with significant experience in civil rights, criminal defense, or prosecution.

### Residency Requirements

Must reside on Chicago's West Side. West Side neighborhoods include: **Austin, Humboldt Park, West Town, West Garfield Park, East Garfield Park, Near West Side, South Lawndale/Little Village, and Lower West Side.**



### Stipend & Application Details

- Commissioners receive a \$1,000 monthly stipend.
- Apply between October 7, 2024 and November 6, 2024.
- ★ ● Commissioners cannot have been an employee of CPD, COPA, or the Police Board in any of the five years immediately preceding their appointment.

*The CCPSA application period opens on October 7, 2024 and closes on November 6, 2024.*

# Proposed CPD Budget & Consent Decree Compliance

Mayor Johnson's proposed budget would devastate CPD's efforts to implement the major reforms required by the federal Consent Decree.

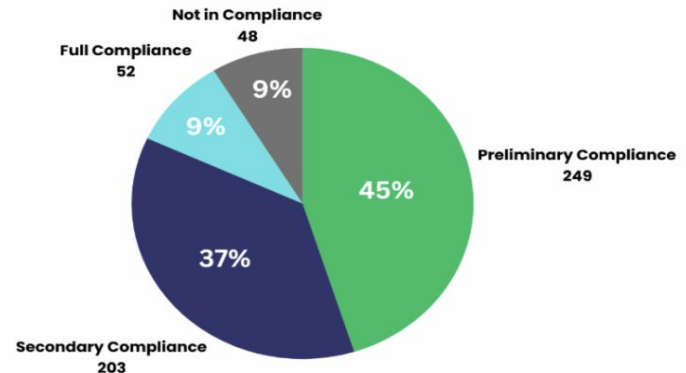
CPD's Office of Constitutional Policing and Reform is responsible for implementing the Department's Consent Decree compliance. **The proposed budget would slash funding to CPD's Office of Constitutional Policing by 45%, and cut staff by more than half, from 65 budgeted employees to 28 next year.**

The budget also proposes steep cuts to CPD's training, community policing, and mental health resources for officers.

Meanwhile, Consent Decree compliance lags far behind where it should be:

# Camera Rebate Program

Write letter to 19th District Alders advocating for the renewal of the community camera rebate program

- 19 PDC has addressed camera rebates by publicizing rebate programs through Special Service Areas (SSAs), which serve commercial corridors.

- Camera rebates for commercial corridors are needed now, as burglaries continue to concentrate on businesses
- The previous citywide camera rebate program was funded with federal COVID relief money, which is expiring
- Alders have noted that because of the large deficit the City is facing, re-funding this program cannot, unfortunately, be a priority
- Going forward, 19 PDC priority will be to explore better use of technology within CPD, including the use of private residential/commercial and POD cameras

# Alternative Emergency Response Model

Work with OEMC, CPD, Thresholds, and any other relevant parties to identify if **diverting appropriate 911 calls** to Thresholds is a workable solution

After considerable effort toward achieving this goal, we received a disheartening email from Sarah Boyle, Deputy Director of Strategic Projects in the Office of the Superintendent of the Chicago Police Department. Instead of proposing a meeting to discuss advancing our objectives as we hoped, the response directed us to the CARE team, the 988 hotline, and the Chicago Council on Mental Health Equity (CCMHE). Given our deep involvement and familiarity with CARE and 988, the response felt dismissive.

Additionally, the Independent Monitoring Team has noted challenges within the CCMHE, including irregular meetings and internal concerns regarding engagement processes. It seems the council is currently undergoing restructuring. In light of this, Jenny has reached out to explore whether there might be value in fostering a partnership between the 19th DC and CCMHE.

District Councilor Schaffer, thank you very much for your email on 29 October 2024. We want to set you and your team up for success for policy recommendations, therefore, I am adding in President Driver to this response as per ordinance all policy recommendations from District Councils are to be made to the Commission. (MCC 82-80-70 (f)).

We believe you will be happy to hear that since 2021, the City of Chicago has had the Crisis Assistance Response and Engagement (CARE) Program. More information on the CARE Program can be found on the City's website: <https://www.chicago.gov/city/en/sites/community-safety/home/CARE-Dashboard.html>

Per the city website, the CARE Program is an initiative led by the Chicago Department of Public Health, with support from the Mayor's Office and other city agencies. Crisis response teams comprised of CDPH behavioral health clinicians and CDPH emergency medical technicians ensure that residents experiencing a mental health challenge can receive compassionate and professional care, and connection to resources to address their unmet health and social needs.

Per the City website, the CARE team seeks to ensure that individuals experiencing a mental health crisis and substance use overdose are assisted by teams of behavioral health professionals, with resources to address their

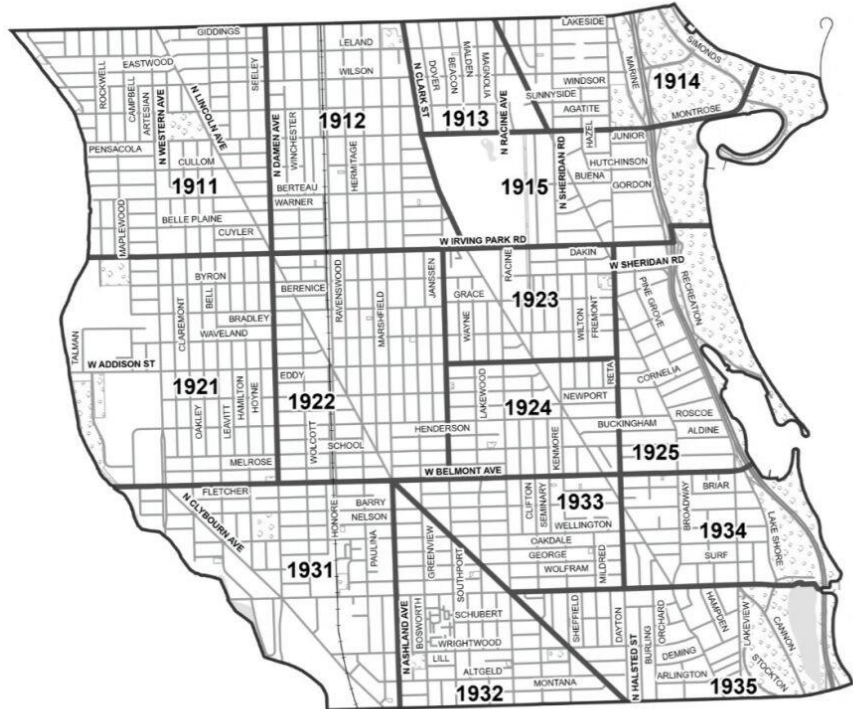

# What We Hear from 019 CPD Command Staff

- Not enough beat officers to appropriately staff all 15 beat cars in the 19th
- Police are asked to respond to the large majority of 911 calls, some of which are better suited to be addressed by other professionals



# 019 CPD Strategic Plan 2024

## *Enforcement response (if applicable):*

The 19<sup>th</sup> District Watch personnel will ensure beat integrity and conduct foot patrols of beats. Tactical Teams will conduct regular Burglary Missions during the timeframes and on the beats which the most burglary incidents occur. District Bike Teams will proactively patrol affected areas for an added police presence.

It should be noted that the 19<sup>th</sup> District will continue its "Retail Corridor" plan to address retail thefts. Some of the response strategies include the following:

- Provide Beat cars information of retail corridors locations on their beat
- Increased high visibility patrols by uniformed officers
- Systematic patrol by beat cars in retail corridors
- Special attention at certain times - openings, closing, and high volume
- Increased foot patrols
- Traffic missions
- Utilizing automatic license plate reader
- CTA station checks and CTA train rides
- Day Bike teams to focus on retail establishment areas while night Bike teams focus on entertainment establishments
- Incident teams identified and readily available to respond, as needed
- Constant and consistent engagement with retail establishments. Work with businesses by meeting and communicating concerns, issues, problems, and successes.

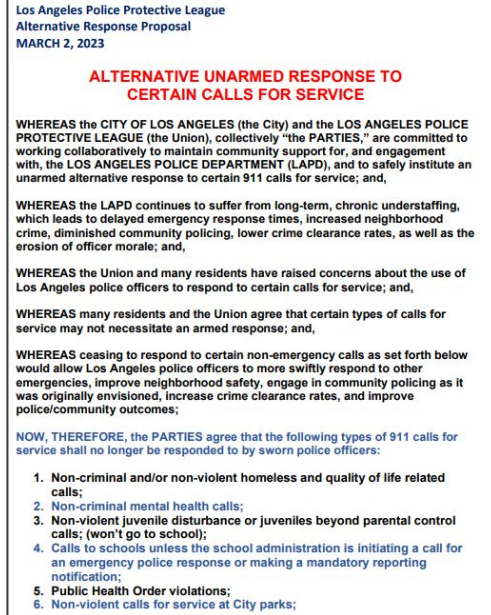
## Current

- Analyzed ~350k+ 911 calls for service to understand volume of different types of calls
- Developed preliminary open-source data visualization and analytical tool
- Enrolled other government agencies/academics to curate classifications & definitions

# Data Cleaning & Vetting

- Original file contained 353,017 calls for service made to 911 between 1/1/2020 - 7/9/2023 in 19th District (obtained via FOIA)
- Focused on 352,948 logs confirmed to be within district (i.e. cleaned data)
- Identified 213,182 **unique** 911 calls for service (used as basis for analysis)

# Developing Open-Source Data Tool

---

What have we built?

- A **database** that can be accessed by industry-standard analytics tools.

Why a database?

- **Data Quality / Integrity** - tracking the rules and steps for cleaning and analyzing data.
- **Data Volume** - Excel can handle 1 million rows at a time, database can handle more.

What cleaning steps have been done?

- **Remove** bad records, **Generate** our own latitude and longitude

Handling new data

- The database can be fed new data, and rules can be written to clean the data by district, if needed.

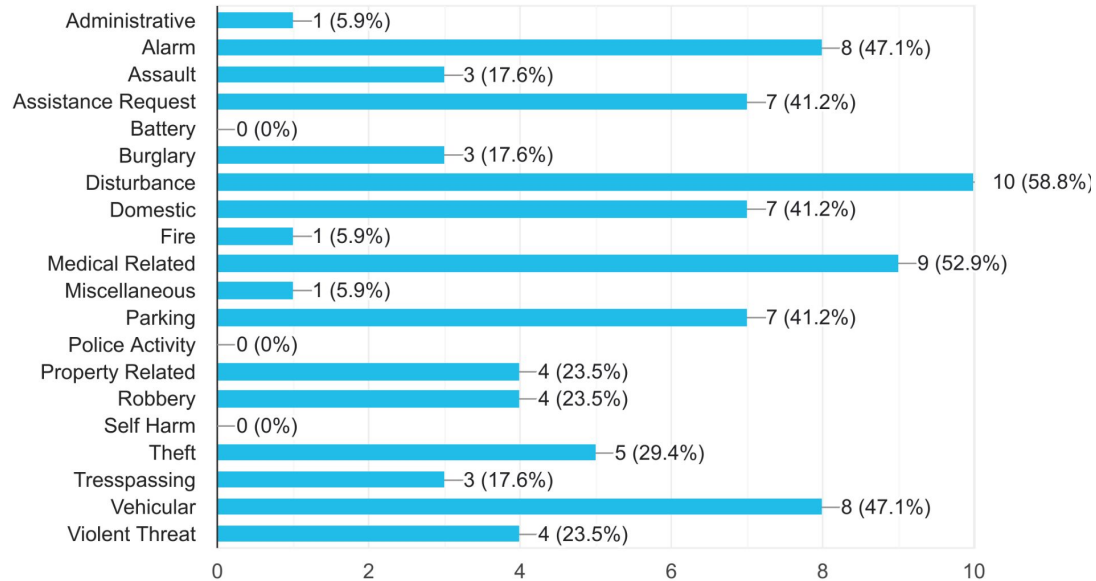
What do you think are the top 5 reasons residents call 911 in the 19th District?

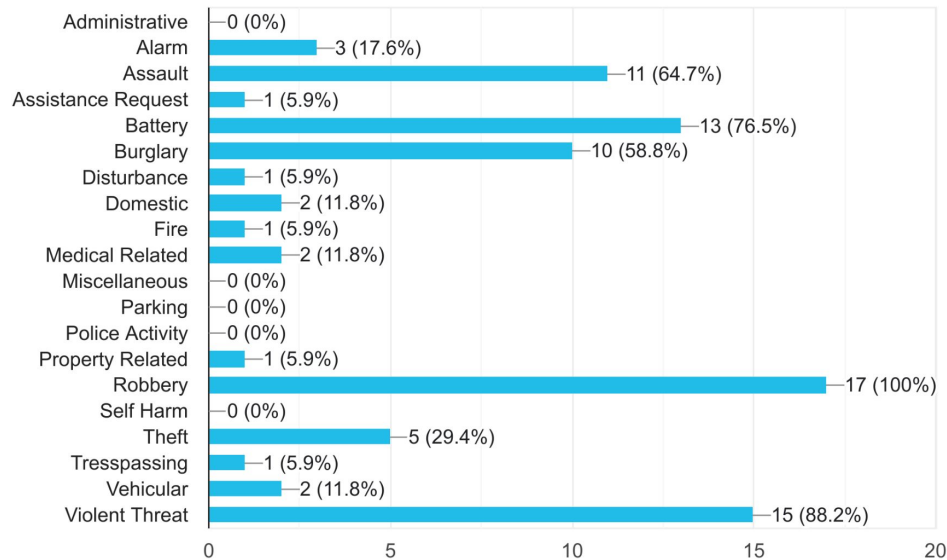
In your opinion, what types of 911 calls **SHOULD** police focus on most?

- **Councilor Garcia met with 019 CPD Command Staff to gain their perspective on where police may/may not be needed for all 324 OEMC codes**
- 019 PDC will enroll other institutions and academic agencies to help vet classifications
- Classification of where police may/may not be needed is **solely the perspective of 019 PDC, and is subject to change as more is investigated/learned**

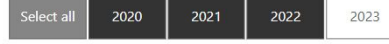

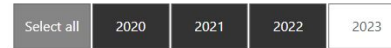

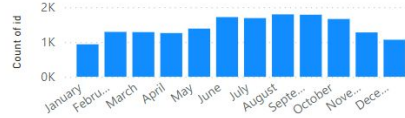

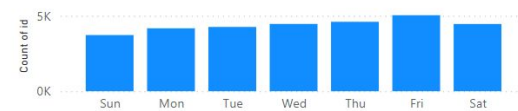
