**Strengthens Chicago's economy** by improving access to jobs and attractions downtown, while generating foot traffic to businesses along the way.


Improves everyday life for residents and employees by making it easier to get to work and go about daily activities.

**Makes travel downtown more reliable** by enabling more than 60,000 people per day to arrive quickly and on schedule using buses in dedicated lanes.



Layout varies by street




Bus Rapid Transit (BRT) is a fast, easy and reliable new option for getting around Chicago, and it's coming to the Loop in 2014. Similar to "L" trains, BRT moves people quickly throughout the city using dedicated bus lanes, making stops at train-like stations along the way.



The **Central Loop BRT** will connect people throughout Chicago's central business district, from Union and Ogilvie stations to Michigan Avenue, using six bus routes on Washington, Madison, Clinton and Canal.

This city-wide initiative enhances access for neighborhoods across the city, with more than 1,700 buses utilizing the corridor every day.
