

X Infectious Disease Update

- CDPH on pace to receive more disease reports in 2024 than in any of the past 5 years
 - Disease Control Bureau has investigated over 20 infectious disease outbreaks this year
 - Resurgence of VPDs likely due to COVID-19 pandemicrelated effects
 - Delays in childhood vaccination rates/shifts in vaccine sentiments
- 64 documented cases of measles since early March
 - Vast majority of cases associated with exposure in new arrivals shelter
 - Rate of infection has slowed due to vaccination. campaign, but recent cases are not associated with the original shelter
 - Broader outreach/education regarding vaccination is necessary




Measles-Containing Vaccines Administered to Chicago Residents



X Change in COVID Reporting Guidelines


- February 2024 IL Administrative Rules for communicable disease reporting were updated to align COVID-19 reporting requirements with those of influenza and newly-reportable RSV.
- After April 30 Hospitals will no longer be required to report hospital respiratory pathogen, bed capacity, and supply data (i.e., "COVID-19 Hospital" data) to HHS.
- After May 18 IDPH will operationalize these updates within I-NEDSS, which will significantly impact CDPH's current data collection processes.
- May 18 August Development of merged respiratory dashboard for planned August launch

Focus Population: Chicago **Public Schools**

- As of March 2024:
 - A total of 342,424 children were enrolled at CPS
 - ~ 2,779 new students enrolled between December and March
 - 79% are Medicaid eligible
 - 84.61% are enrolled in Medicaid

Financial Updates: Grants – Mary Emmanuel

Submitted:

- 1/16/2024: Support and Scale Up of HIV Prevention Services in Sexual Health Clinics (\$1,000,000)
 - Strengthen the infrastructure of CDPH's STI Specialty Clinics and improve service delivery to address the Syndemic of HIV and other sexually transmitted infections (STIs).
- 3/29/2024: Strengthening Public Health Systems and Services through National Partnerships to Improve and Protect the Nation's Health (\$700,000)
 - Strengthen CDPH's capacity and readiness to launch a national Community of Practice (CoP) to design and share local and national promising practices to reduce gaps and reverse declines in life expectancy.

In Progress:

- 4/29/2024: High-Impact HIV Prevention and Surveillance Programs for Health Departments (\$9,466,440)
 - Implement a comprehensive, person-centered HIV prevention and surveillance program to prevent new HIV infections and improve the health of people with HIV in addition to supporting community engagement, health equity, Syndemic and whole person approaches to HIV prevention.

Ending:

No grants ending as of 4/31/2024.



Financial Updates: Opioid Settlement – Mary Emmanuel

- The Illinois Opioid Allocation Agreement and a complementary agreement between the City of Chicago and the IL Attorney General govern the amount of funds Chicago will receive directly from national opioid settlements.
- Chicago will receive approx. \$90 mil. in settlement funds over the next eighteen years (Attorney General's Office est.)
- Pursuant to the terms of the settlement and affiliated agreements, these funds must be utilized for outside counsel fees and approved abatement programs identified in the allocation agreement.
- CDPH has expended approx. \$4 mil. of received funds, with much more planned for existing and future programs across eight priority areas.



Financial Updates: Opioid Settlement Priority Areas – Mary Emmanuel

Priority Area	Description
Low-Barrier Harm Reduction	Improve access to and education around key harm reduction resources to promote the health and wellbeing of people who use drugs and prevent overdose deaths.
Linkage to Care & Substance Use Disorder Treatment	Invest in trauma-informed linkage to care and evidence-based treatment services for substance use disorder so that all Chicagoans in need of substance use disorder treatment are able to access a range of treatment services.
Long-Term Supports for People in Recovery	Invest in a holistic recovery support infrastructure citywide to destigmatize recovery and foster healthy communities of people in recovery.
Public Safety Partnerships	Work with public safety systems to support their ability to respond to the needs of people who use drugs with evidence-based treatment and recovery services to prevent cyclical utilization of emergency health and public safety systems and promote the long-term health and wellbeing of people who use drugs
Data Analysis, Epidemiology, & Geographical Analytics	Conduct actionable data analysis to inform effective interventions and provide community partners with community-level data to support holistic programming.
Education, Communication, & Outreach	Increase investment in public education around substance use, overdose prevention, and evidence-based treatment options, and promote stigma-reduction messaging.
Systems Coordination	Serve as a central convening hub for data and information related to substance use, work with other city departments to integrate public health and overdose prevention practices into their programming, collaborate with community partners, state partners, and neighboring local jurisdictions, to build a cohesive continuum of care for people with substance use disorder in Chicago.
CDPH Staffing	Increase the data and geographic analytic capability, internal evaluation, communications, and project management capacity of the CDPH Office of Substance Use.



Financial Updates: Juul Settlement – Mary Emmanuel



The Settlement

- The City filed suit against various entities for engaging in unfair and/or deceptive marketing in the selling of vaping products to Chicagoans under 21 years of age.
 - EQUTE litigation still ongoing
 - Juul Settlement: \$23.8 million awarded to the City of Chicago
- Chicago high school students are 10x more likely to use e-cigarettes than traditional combustible cigarettes.
- 10.9% of Chicago adults report being current smokers. Smoking rates are higher among Black residents (16.9%), people living at or below poverty (17.9%) and LGBTQ+ residents (14.4%)

CDPH Action

- Juul Settlement funds will be used to mitigate youth vaping through education, local policies, parent and teacher supports, cessation supports, improvements in data, community engagement and outreach initiatives
- 500K has been expended to date
 - A creative firm, Youth Marketing Connection, was selected in late 2023 and has developed an educational media campaign around smoking cessation. Will launch May, 2024
 - CDPH plans to release an educational RFP with \$500 for two years to reach young adults and parents/guardians and all those that support youth: teachers, coaches, and other school support staff. Estimated 50,000 people to be reached in first two years
