22 previous meeting held on September 10th. The

24 minutes. And if there are no corrections. I move

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1 the Works Progress Administration and was based on

- 2 plans by Jens Jensen. When it was completed, it
- 3 was one of the City's first public housing
- 4 developments. Over time, however, the buildings
- 5 deteriorated, and the site was the subject of a
- 6 number of redevelopment proposals as early as 2006.
- 7 The CHA subsequently selected the
- 8 Lathrop Community Partners, which is a partnership
- 9 between Related Midwest and Bickerdike Redevelopment
- 10 Corporation, as the master developer of the site.
- 11 Work on the redevelopment of the northern phase
- 12 began in 2017 and was fully completed by 2019.
- 13 The need to redevelop the Lathrop
- 14 Homes led to the designation of the Diversey/
- 15 Chicago River TIF District in October of 2016. At
- 16 that time the boundaries of the TIF did not include
- 17 the entire Lathrop Homes development. As we
- 18 previously displayed, the south section remained
- 19 outside of any TIF district, so TIF funds cannot be
- 20 used pay for improvements in that area.
- 21 With development of the southern
- 22 portion of the site now in progress, DPD believes
- 23 that TIF is necessary to support these phases of
- 24 redevelopment and is seeking approval of the first

1 preserve the historic facades.

2 Here we see the building covered in

- 3 graffiti and demonstrating clear code violations,
- 4 including a lack of building openings. These
- 5 vacant units could otherwise be occupied and
- 6 provide much needed affordable housing.
- 7 The proposed land uses are the same
- 8 as in the original Diversey/Chicago River area.
- 9 The added area is zoned as a planned development,
- 10 and the amendment will allow for the land uses of
- 11 residential, open space, public institution, and
- 12 mixed use. These land uses cover all aspects of
- 13 the Lathrop Homes renovations and will allow for
- 14 greater flexibility in the future.
- 15 Here is the amended budget for the
- 16 entire TIF district, both including the original
- 17 and expanded areas. This accounts for the
- 18 anticipated costs related to the remaining phases
- 19 of work as well as future public infrastructure
- 20 projects that may be pursued.
- 21 Given all the factors, DPD believes
- 22 that this amendment is necessary for the swift
- 23 redevelopment of the remaining Lathrop Homes, and
- 24 we would request that the Community Development

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- 1 amendment of the Diversey/Chicago River TIF
- 2 District in order to expand its boundaries to
- 3 reflect the entirety of the Lathrop Homes
- 4 development.
- 5 In addition to expanding the
- 6 boundaries, related changes will also include
- 7 increasing the budget to account for the additional
- 8 area. Otherwise, the plan remains completely
- 9 unchanged in its goal to restore the Lathrop Homes.
- 10 In order for a TIF district to be
- 11 eligible for an expansion, the proposed area must
- 12 show characteristics of blight, deterioration,
- 13 obsolescence, and/or other signs of disinvestment.
- 14 In the case of Lathrop Homes
- 15 expansion, it demonstrates several qualifying
- 16 criteria. Additionally, at least half the
- 17 buildings in the area must be older than 35 years,
- 18 which was obviously true for the nearly 100-year-
- 19 old Lathrop Homes development. This is all
- 20 mandated by the state of Illinois TIF Act.
- As this picture shows, the southern
- 22 portion of Lathrop Homes is currently deteriorated
- 23 and vacant. The exteriors of the buildings need
- 24 extensive repairs, including brick pointing to

- 16 L-e-i-g-h. And I'm here because, of course, I'm
- 17 going to always oppose TIF until someone does some
- 18 type of investigation when it comes to TIF.
- 19 My mother was denied TIF money when
- 20 she was trying to rehab our building, 7954-7958
- 21 South Halsted. My mother had everything; the
- 22 blueprints, went and hired an architect, engineer,
- 23 all of that. My mother also has a nonprofit, and
- $\,$  24  $\,$  did everything she was supposed to do and got

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1 denied this.

So when I come in here and see
3 \$60 million for CHA old housing and hear mixed
4 income and low income when I know that's a
5 money-laundering racket and a tactic because a lot
6 of people that are low income are getting promised
7 that once these are fixed -- they're living in,
8 once they're fixed, they're going to put them back

9 in these places, and they don't. And then they're

10 displaced all over the place. And that's a

11 problem. And it's only black people.

12 And I'm starting to see this cycle, 13 and I'm just looking at this. Now I see that they 14 even have a TIF Act. There's a law. And the law

15 is being violated all the time. Like this is a

16 money-laundering racket.

And until HUD investigates, this TIF
money is going to continue to be terrible in our
community. This TIF money is supposed to be for

20 blighted areas on the South Side and West Side, and21 you all can't even get that together. Auburn

22 Gresham, that's where our family's building was.

23 When my mother came in there with the PowerPoint

24 what she was going to do with these blueprints, my

1 mother put \$500,000 of her own money in there. And

2 once you start asking for this TIF money, it was

3 like, How dare you. How dare you, black woman,4 come in here with all the qualifications and ask

5 for TIF money when we already have given this to a

6 white developer.

So because of that and because mymother kept fighting, you all kept putting these

9 weird tax bills on there. My mother still was

10 paying that. And then put in a nonprofit. All of

11 a sudden you all knocked the building down.12 So now I'm fighting with the City

12 So now I'm fighting with the City 13 with getting paid. So I'm going to continue to

13 with getting paid. So I'm going to continue to14 come to these things. I'm going to continue to

15 research this stuff. I'm going to continue to talk

16 to seniors.

17 Those two black seniors that came in

18 here today earlier, Washington Park, Jeanette19 Taylor ward, trying to move them out. They been in

20 them houses for 55 years. You all pushing us out

21 of our communities for affordable housing that's

22 not even for us. You all displacing us and keeping

23 us out there on the street. And you all think

24 somebody going to continue to allow this.

This city going to flip red. I

2 promise you it's going to flip red in less than 30

3 days. And then we're going to work on getting

4 those people out of here and investigate because

5 you all are using us. You all are using our

6 statistics. You all are using all this blighted

7 stuff. This is not fair. It's not fair.

8 VICE CHAIRPERSON THOMAS: Thank you.

MS. JACKSON: My name is Jessica Jackson.

14 And first of all, I want to say it's

15 good to see that the stenographer is here because

16 that's one thing that's missing in the probate

19 probate process, which is one of the processes

20 that's used to take black people's property.

Now, you all have heard me talk

22 about this before because I recognize a lot of you

23 all's faces just like I'm sure you recognize mine.

24 And the horrible thing is is that no one is doing

1 anything at all about the reality of black people's

2 properties getting taken from them.

3 All this TIF money that you here and

4 talking about, that's supposed to be for buildings

 $5\,$  that are at least 35 years old, that are in blight

6 areas, that are vacant units, all those things7 apply to the buildings on the South Side and West

8 Side of Chicago. And to sit here and continuously

9 talk about how you bringing in new development to

10 the North Side, to the North Side, downtown, to the

11 North Side, and then when you look at the South

12 Side in particular areas like South Shore when

13 there's -- when you have no interest in rebuilding

14 those historical black brick buildings on the South15 Side. There's absolutely no interest in that.

And it's all kind of vacant lots,

17 vacant buildings. It's no way people in this room

18 don't know that. It is absolutely no way. And for

19 that to keep getting bypassed, and then the only

20 thing you want to put is low-income housing, mixed-

21 income housing, low-income housing, subsidized

22 housing as if people don't own property. People 23 want to own property.

24 This thing of pushing poverty and

Page 18 1 below poverty down people's throats to act as 2 though people cannot work, as if there's not a 3 working class that can pay rent and keep the 4 property that's all in our communities so that 5 property taxes are put into our community. The applicant is the 14 Chicago Department of Transportation. 15 Taylor Street bridge is providing a 16 new pedestrian and vehicle connection across the 17 railroad and the south branch of the Chicago River. 18 We are currently looking to acquire land from 19 Riverline parcels, which is on the east side of the 20 the river. 21 The total project cost is 93 million, 22 and the right-of-way acquisition will be about 23 \$3 million. 24 The timeline of the project will be

21 Transportation is seeking authority to acquire part

22 of certain properties located along Taylor Street

23 and Wells Street located in the Roosevelt/Clark TIF

24 Redevelopment Project Area.

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1 phase 1 is currently ongoing. It will be complete 2 in the second quarter of 2025. Phase 2 engineering

3 will be completed third quarter of 2026. And we

4 are looking to start construction in the fourth

5 quarter of 2026.

6 Here's a map of what we're looking 7 at. So you can see too -- on the left, you will 8 see existing Taylor Street bridge. And right

9 there, there is an area where there was the old

10 Taylor Street bridge, which does not exist right

11 now. So Taylor Street bridge would go over the

12 rail yard, across the south branch of the Chicago

13 River, and then over a section of right-of-way that

14 we currently have, which is called Taylor Street, 15 but there's not a bridge -- a roadway there

16 currently, and would come down to Wells Street.

17 And on the right side, you can see

18 the red -- I mean, sorry, the green squares which

19 is Riverline properties, and we are looking to

20 acquire a portion of their property. 21

We have a purpose of need, but I 22 have a little bit of an updated purpose of need

23 that I'd like to read to you all. For several

24 reasons, the South Loop has had poor east-west

- 1 street connectivity. Unlike the route in River
- 2 North where local streets cross the Chicago River
- 3 every one-fourth to an eighth-mile interval, the
- 4 South Loop there is currently only one intermediate
- 5 street, Roosevelt Road, that crosses the river, and
- 6 that is along a 1.2-mile stretch between Harrison
- 7 Street and 18th Street.
- In addition to being a critical
- 9 artery for local traffic, Roosevelt Road also is
- 10 important for regional traffic. It is the only
- 11 east-west street to connect directly between
- 12 I-90/94 and DuSable Lake Shore Drive for more than
- 13 a two-mile stretch. Roosevelt is also essential to
- 14 accessing the museum campus and south Grant Park,
- 15 which includes Soldier Field.
- 16 The limited access creates a
- 17 bottleneck for large volumes of traffic on
- 18 Roosevelt Road and results in chronic congestion,
- 19 especially at the resident -- especially as the
- 20 residential population in the South Loop has grown
- 21 rapidly over the last 30 years. Carrying nearly
- 22 30,000 vehicles per day, Roosevelt Road is the
- 23 busiest roadway across -- over the river in the
- 24 central area. During special events, the traffic
- 1 volume can more than double.
- Roosevelt Road is also critical for
- 3 transit access. It has four CTA buses along that
- 4 route, and those buses serve more than 20,000
- 5 riders per day.
- 6 Due to the rail yard and other major
- 7 infrastructure, it is very difficult to physically
- 8 locate any new bridges across the Chicago River in
- 9 this area. The only location we have is Taylor
- 10 Street because of the previous bridge that was
- 11 there. So it gives us the space to be able to put
- 12 the piers needed to go across the river again.
- 13 Reestablishing the Taylor Street
- 14 bridge will significantly benefit overall traffic
- 15 and connectivity in the South Loop. Taylor Street
- 16 is 1/6 mile north of Roosevelt and directly
- 17 connected to I-90/94 west of the river. To the
- 18 east, it will connect with Wells Street and the new
- 19 Wells/Wentworth connector, providing access north
- 20 to local streets, including 9th Street, Polk,
- 21 Harrison as well as south to 18th Street, Cermak
- 22 Road, and the future 15th Street extension.
- 23 The new Taylor Street connection
- 24 will serve people walking and biking as well as

- Page 24 1 driving and taking transit. With protected bike
- 2 lanes connecting between UIC and west to the new
- 3 Wells/Wentworth on the east, the new bridge will
- 4 provide a valuable lower-stress route across the
- 5 river for people biking.
- Overall, the new bridge will help to
- 7 improve traffic distribution and capacity as future
- 8 South Loop developments occur, allowing current and
- 9 future residents and visitors to more conveniently
- 10 travel from and to the areas around the river.
- 11 So next we have just a map of the
- 12 Roosevelt/Clark TIF District. And you can see in
- 13 red where the new Taylor Street bridge would be put
- 14 into place.
- 15 Just some more pictures here. The
- 16 picture looking east, so you can see the railroad
- 17 tracks, which we would be going over. And then a
- 18 picture looking north, you can see the river and
- 19 beautiful downtown Chicago.
- 20 The next is a cross-section of what
- 21 we'd be looking to be putting in for Taylor Street.
- 22 So you can see that there is a 12-foot roadway
- 23 lane. There would be a bike lane. And then a
- 24 pedestrian sidewalk on the outside. And then the

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1 same flipped on the other side.

- And then this next picture shows
- 3 you -- so this is east of the river. You can see
- 4 the yellow is the right-of-way that we're looking
- 5 to acquire. And then the red would be permanent
- 6 easement that we're looking to share with the
- 7 buildings to have access to maintain the new bridge
- 8 that we'll be putting in.
- 9 Just the parcel information. The
- 10 north and south parcel which is both owned by
- 11 Riverline.
- 12 So the total amount for this project
- 13 would be 93.5 million. We're doing 1.5 million for
- 14 phase 1, 5 million for phase 2, 3 million for the
- 15 right-of-way acquisition, and 84 million for
- 16 construction, which brings us to a total of 93.5
- 17 million.

- 18 So the acquisition would consist of
- 19 partially taking and permanent easement these
- 20 properties located on Taylor Street and Wells
- 21 within the Roosevelt/Clark TIF District.
- 22 That's my presentation. If you have
- 23 any questions, I am happy to answer them. VICE CHAIRPERSON THOMAS: Thank you.

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Page 26 I would like to recognize Alderman 2 Irvin or Alderman Conway if they're present or 3 their staff to make a statement on this project. (No response.) 5 Mr. Patel, is there a written letter 6 of support from both the aldermen for this matter? MR. PATEL: Yes. We have a written letter of 8 support from Alderman Conway. VICE CHAIRPERSON THOMAS: What about Alderman 10 Irvin? MR. PATEL: So TIF will be all coming from 11 12 the Roosevelt/Clark TIF. So that's --

13 VICE CHAIRPERSON THOMAS: So it's just the 14 34th Ward?

15 MR. PATEL: Correct.

16 VICE CHAIRPERSON THOMAS: Okay. Thank you.

17 No written statements from the

18 public were submitted on this matter.

19 If there are any -- if there aren't

20 any further questions from the Commissioners --

21 COMMISSIONER CHAN McKIBBEN: I have.

22 VICE CHAIRPERSON THOMAS: Commissioner Chan 23 McKibben.

COMMISSIONER CHAN McKIBBEN: Yeah. I think --

1 no further questions from the Commission, I would 2 now like to invite members of the public who are in

3 the audience and interested in speaking on this

4 matter.

5 Each speaker will be limited to 6 three minutes and asked to keep any statements 7 relevant to the request before us.

8 Please state your name before you

9 speak.

10 MS. LEIGH: Zoe Leigh, Z-o-e L-e-i-g-h. 11 You all asked if there are any homes

12 affected by -- well, does it matter? Because mine

13 was affected, and nobody didn't care. I can't even

14 go to my alderman now, David Moore. He can't -- he

15 won't even speak to me.

16 Now, we got land over there. That's 17 my land. On top of the land that I have over

18 there, I got a Save A Lot sitting on part of my

19 land, and that's a whole nother lawsuit because you

20 all just giving -- the City just gave that to Save

21 A Lot. Like this is just what the South Side does.

22 So like for the Commissioner just to 23 say, Oh, you know, this gets overlooked, the South

24 Side and West Side get overlooked all the time.

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1 I'm always for improvements to the south branch of

2 the river because I think the south branch of the

3 river is often the overlooked branch.

Are there -- I'm kind of familiar

5 with the east end of where the Taylor Street bridge

6 ends. But are there any residential areas nearby?

7 And were there any community engagements with

8 residential communities?

MR. PATEL: There are residential areas

10 there. We have not yet done any community outreach

11 because we're still in the early stages of phase 1.

12 But before phase 1 is complete, we will be doing

13 community outreach, and we will have a public

14 meeting. We will advertise in the newspaper the

15 public meeting and allow people to come and ask any

16 questions they would like to about the project.

17 COMMISSIONER CHAN McKIBBEN: Thank you.

18 VICE CHAIRPERSON THOMAS: Vice Chair Thomas.

19 Are any residential properties affected by the

20 easement or the right-of-way?

21 MR. PATEL: No. Currently the property to

22 the south end is vacant land, and the property to

23 the north end is a parking lot.

24 VICE CHAIRPERSON THOMAS: Okay. If there are On top of that, you all steal our

2 properties, give it to developers. You all are

3 going to give \$93 million to this. No problem.

4 Before that, \$60 million. My mother asked for

5 \$2 million and couldn't even get that with the

6 blueprints, with everything to show what she was

7 going to do for the affordable housing in a TIF

8 district. Instead you all knocked the whole

9 building down. But you all can come in here and

10 approve 60 million and 93 million like this, like

11 this on the North Side, downtown for the river,

12 Chicago city river. But when it comes to the

13 city -- when it comes to the South Side, Auburn

14 Gresham can't get none -- can't get no help, can't

15 get no TIF money, can't get anything. It's a

16 problem.

17 You all just take -- you all just

18 take it, just snatch it, just take our property.

19 And then we come down here for a year, and nobody

20 don't say nothing. I've asked to meet with a

21 couple of you all about how this TIF money work,

22 but you all can't meet with us because you all

23 taken an oath that you all can't help black people;

24 if I get in this office, I promise you I will not

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1 help Negroes, I will not help Negroes at all.

- 2 That's what you all do. This is a democratic
- 3 party, and you all yet to help me for a year. So
- 4 I'm going to keep coming down, keep investigating
- 5 until the Department of Justice gets involved
- 6 because niggers is going to jail because you all
- 7 continue to play in our face and you all think that
- 8 somebody's going to continue to deal with this.
- 9 It's a new generation.
- 10 You all are not about to play my
- 11 mother. Somebody want to find some money for my
- 12 mother, so I was going to help her get whatever she
- 13 want to do, build on our land that we still have
- 14 while we're still going through the federal court
- 15 right now waiting for a decision.
- 16 Like at the end of the day -- and
- 17 this is your fault, Latasha Thomas. This is you,
- 18 your fault. That's why I'm going to keep coming in
- 19 here until you make right, until you go talk to
- 20 David Moore and they figure out what they going to
- 21 do with our property that you knew was my family's
- 22 property. So that's why I'm going to keep coming
- 23 in here.
- 24 VICE CHAIRPERSON THOMAS: Thank you for your

- 1 be able to withstand all the insults, all the bad
- 2 treatment of the people that were of their own race
- 3 that was literally just feet away in the field.
- 4 How that mind was trained like that to be able to
- 5 see your own -- sometimes it was your own family
- 6 members that was suffering like that. And you,
- 7 because you was in master's house, felt so removed
- 8 from that. And I think that's a big problem in
- 9 black leadership today.
- That's what makes you removed from
- 11 it. That's what makes you look irritated when
- 12 black people talk about their problems. It's about
- 13 to drive you crazy.
- 14 Commissioner Boatright, you about to
- 15 go crazy right now. It's all over your face.
- 16 You're not going to speak on our behalf when we
- 17 leave here. In fact, you're going to hook up with
- 18 the Hispanic preacher. Look at you looking at him
- 19 for approval. It's so sick. But it's something
- 20 that our race has suffered from for centuries and
- 21 centuries and centuries. That's why when you hear
- 22 people say you need to do like the other groups do,
- 23 we need to -- that's like -- you know that's a
- 24 crazy ideology because you know none of them have

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1 comment.

- 2 Any other -- okay. Please state 3 your name before you make your comment.
- 4 MS. JACKSON: My name is Jessica Jackson.
- 5 And I'm just curious -- and I mean this with all
- 6 sincerity. With all sincerity. I just don't
- 7 understand how as a black person that you can just
- 8 sit idly by and allow our areas, our communities to
- 9 just get depleted like this when you have the power
- 10 of position to do something about it. I really
- 11 don't care.
- 12 You all sit here and you act like
- 13 you're irritated because we come in here and talk
- 14 about it. Does it upset you? Does it embarrass
- 15 you because we're talking about our property?
- 16 Should we know better than to come down here and
- 17 make a ruckus? Is that what it is? Because it's
- 18 like a mental something. And you can't discount it
- 19 as not being real because if you know the history
- 20 of black people in the United States of America, do
- 21 you know for sure -- and you look like educated
- 22 women, such as I am, so you know historically there
- 23 is a thing called the house Negro and the field
- 24 Negro. And the house Negro was actually trained to

- Page 33 1 the same history in this country that black America
- 2 does. So I don't know except for it's just a
- 3 sickness of the mind. There it is. Hope you get
- 4 some psychiatric treatment for your sedition one
- 5 day.
- VICE CHAIRPERSON THOMAS: Thank you for yourcomment.
- If there are no further question
- 8 If there are no further questions or
- 9 comments regarding the matter before us, I will
- 10 call the item to a vote.
- 11 The resolution before us, the
- 12 Department of Transportation is seeking authority
- 13 to acquire part of certain properties located
- 14 along Taylor Street and Wells Street located in
- 15 the Roosevelt/Clark Tax Increment Financing
- 16 Redevelopment Project Area.
- 17 If there are no objections, I move
- 18 passage of this item by the same roll call vote
- 19 previously used to establish quorum.
  - (No response.)
- 21 Hearing none, the motion is
- 22 approved.
