PLANNING PROCESS OVERVIEW

Plan Overview

The two-year planning process will update the 2002 Calumet Area Land Use Plan and 2004 Calumet Design Guidelines to establish a 10- to 20-year vision for the region that ensures future development balances economic, job creation, health & safety, and environmental goals.

What is a Land Use Plan?

A land use plan is a planning tool that communicates a community's vision for how a collection of properties should be used. The plan details specific recommendations for each type of use (e.g., industrial, open space, commercial, etc.).

 Outcomes: Land use plans establish a set of goals and/or a vision for an area, including a land use map that communicates desired land uses.

What are Design Guidelines?

Design guidelines are a set of recommendations that shape to the physical form of an individual property. Design Guidelines apply to new development, redevelopment, and expansion.

Key Terms

- Industrial Corridor
 - Industrial Corridors are areas of primarily industrially-zoned parcels and uses together in a continuous geography that the Plan Commission or City Council designates
- Industrial ("M") Zoning
 - Chicago's industrial zones are referred to as "M" (Manufacturing) zones which are intended to accommodate manufacturing, warehousing, wholesale, and industrial uses.
- Planned Manufacturing District (PMD)
 A PMD is a zoning district established to further foster manufacturing and industrial uses by prohibiting incompatible uses allowed in other industrial ("M") districts.

Prior Plans

The planning team has reviewed 30+ plans. Topics covered in those plans include:

- Land use and zoning
- Economic development
- Open space and trails
- Waterway and natural resources
- Public health and environmental justice
- Transportation

Citywide Industrial Corridor Planning Considerations

The statements below are considerations that industrial corridors citywide are looking into, and considerations from the Citywide framework plan:

- Strengthen Chicago's Industrial Corridors as economic engines and vital job centers
- Improve access for all transportation modes
- Enhance unique natural and built assets
- Use environmental justice principles to establish criteria and policies for geographies harmed by environmental degradation
- **Balance the economic benefits** of moving goods **with negative impacts** on communities, eliminating, then equitably distributing burdens

CALUMET AT A GLANCE

The team reviewed data related to land use, open space acreage, as well as key demographic data for the planning area and surrounding neighborhoods.

PLANNING GOALS ACTIVITY

The group participated in an activity to demonstrate how to have respectful disagreements within the working group.

The group then applied the activity to evaluate how the Citywide Industrial Corridor Planning Considerations may or may not apply in Calumet. Those Planning Considerations (or goal statements) include:

- Strengthen Chicago's Industrial Corridors as economic engines and vital job centers
- Improve access for all transportation modes
- Enhance unique natural and built assets

- Use environmental justice principles to establish criteria and policies for geographies harmed by environmental degradation
- Balance the economic benefits of moving goods with negative impacts on communities, eliminating, then equitably distributing burdens.

Participants identified three words to describe their sentiment towards each goal statement. The terms *balanced* and *protection* were used twice each. Other key words and phrases used were *important*, *timely*, *profits*, and *centering human beings*.

The group was then asked to what extent they agreed or disagreed with each of the goal statements. The Zoom Poll results are included at the end of this document. Key takeaways include:

- Participants overwhelmingly agreed or strongly agreed with each goal, though several goals elicited more nuanced commentary.
- The description of "strengthen" in reference to industrial corridors in the first statement was discussed, with some participants questioning whether that was appropriate in Calumet
- In general, participants noted that some of the words and phrasing in the statements are vague and could have multiple interpretations. For example, the *Improve access for all transportation modes* raised questions around which specific modes / routes would be prioritized in Calumet: highways, freight, buses, waterways, etc.
- The team expressed interest in continuing to explore the goals and priorities at a subsequent meeting.

NEXT STEPS

The next Working Group meeting is January 14th on Zoom. The calendar invite has already been sent out.

The first public Community Meeting is on January 30th at the South Chicago Salud Center (3039 E. 91st St.) from 6:00 – 8:00pm.
