

American Rescue Plan Act Project & Expenditure Report Guide October 1 – December 31, 2024

Under Mayor Brandon Johnson, the City of Chicago continues its essential work of supporting residents and communities recovering from the COVID-19 pandemic. By implementing innovative programs funded through this one-time infusion of federal dollars from the American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA), the City is dedicated to maximizing the impact of these funds to help communities recover. This report provides an overview of the latest ARPA obligation and expenditure changes for Quarter 4 2024, followed by view of ARPA obligation and expenditure progress to date for community initiatives.

Project Highlights

Youth Opportunity Programs

Youth Opportunity Programs has expended over \$7.6m this quarter of its \$66m total allocation. The program works with community partners to provide youth programming focused on increasing work-readiness, developing leadership skills, and promoting positive changes in attitudes or behaviors. To date, 12,646 youth have participated in summer youth programs with an additional 1,591 youth participating in year-round programs.

Diverse Learners Recovery Fund

Diverse Learners Recovery Fund provides one-time, unrestricted cash assistance to low- and moderate-income students with diverse learning needs, including those with disabilities. Thus far the program has supported 6,847 households across Chicago, providing families with the flexibility to catch up on bills, fund additional childcare, and afterschool programs for their child with diverse learning needs.

Family Connects Program

Family Connects Program engages community service providers with short-term nurse home visits to support all birthing persons, newborns, and their families. To date 5,874 families have benefited from home visits, which include comprehensive physical assessments along with connections to resources tailored to each family's specific needs.
